CHARGE OF TRESPASS, AGAINST SEVEN MEN

JUSTICE ALLSPAUGH OF EAGLE CREEK ALLEGES TIMBERMEN OVERSTEPPED BOUNDS.

Constable Ely went out to Eagle Creek Wednesday morning with warrants for the arrest of seven men. The warrants were caused to be issued through Justice of the Peace A. E. Allspaugh of Eagle Creek. The seven men for whom warrants were drawn are Charles and Herman Linderman, N. Rowley, Henry and Richard Gibbons, John Doe and Richard Roe, on the charge of trespassing.

The Linderman Bros. own and operate a sawmill in the vicinity of Eagle Creek and the other men who were arrested were working for the mill, cutting trees on the land owned by Allspaugh. The sawmill men had a contract with Allspaugh allowing them to cut wood on his property, but Allspaugh claims that Linderman Bros had overstepped the provisions therein and the plaintiff thus instituted the charge, after ordering them off.

The hearing has been deferred until Monday and will be in Justice Stipp's court.

OUT ALL NIGHT 'TILL BROAD DAYLIGHT

Serious Allegations Made by Fred Chard Against His Wife Frances.

Before the circuit court of Clackamas county, Fred F. Chard, plaintiff, has instituted suit against Frances Chard, defendant, to dissolve bonds of matrimony. The plaintiff complains and alleges as follows:

That the plaintiff now is and has been for more than one year last past a resident and inhabitant of the State of Oregon. That the defendant, whose maiden name was Frances Hollabaugh and plaintiff, Fred F. Chard, were married at Portland on the 24th day of November, 1904; that the said parties lived together as husband and wife until April 15, 1905, when the said defendant, disregarding the solemnities of the marriage vows willfully and without cause deserted and abandoned the plaintiff and ever since has willfully lived separate from him without sufficient cause or reason and against his will.

That from February, 1905, the defendant has been guilty of cruel and inhuman treatment, making life burdensome for plaintiff in ways that cannot be set down at this time. That from two to five times during the week she went to places of amusement and would not return until 12 o'clock, midnight, and two o'clock a. m., and she would submit herself to the embraces of other men; and that she has broken up his household.

There are no children, and no property involved in the suit.

Husband Sues for Divorce.

James F. Robinson has begun suit against Minnie Robinson for decree of divorce. The couple were married at Pomeroy, Wash., September 13, 1887. Both are now residents of the state of Oregon. The plaintiff avers he has always treated his wife as a true and devoted husband should but he says that in March, 1904, the defendant, disregarding the solemnity of her marriage vows, willfully and without cause, deserted and abandoned the plaintiff, and ever since has and still continues so to willfully and without cause desert and abandon said plaintiff, and to live separate and apart from him, against his will and without his consent. There are no children.

Sandy Will Entertain Oddfellows.

A big demonstration is to occur at Sandy on Saturday when the I. O. O. F. degree team of this city, headed by Judge Thomas F. Ryan, the Deputy Grand Master, will institute a lodge of the order in that place. There will be delegations from many places and the lodge members are looking forward to this meeting with pleasure. Canby, Oregon City, Molalla, Gresham, Estacada, Clackamas and Portland will be represented. The degree team will leave Oregon City on Saturday afternoon at three o'clock, take the electric cars to Estacada and from there drive out to Sandy.

Funeral of Charles Burkhardt.

The funeral of Charles Burkhardt took place Thursday at 2 o'clock from the funeral parlors of Shank & Bissell. Mr. Burkhardt passed away at San Jose, Cal., and the body was brought to this city for burial in the family lot in Mountain View cemetery. Rev. Kraxberger preached the funeral service.

DRUNKEN MAN TIED TO TREE IN YARD

GEORGE MACINAW RAISES CAIN AT NEIGHBOR'S IN ELYVILLE —GIVEN THIRTY DAYS.

George Macinaw was Thursday given 30 days in the city jail for being drunk and disorderly on the streets and causing a lot of commotion on the property of neighbors in Elyville.

George came home Tuesday evening in an intoxicated condition and began to raise a rough house. On being reprimanded he went out and sought shelter in one of the neighbors homes, where he began to create much disturbance. He was finally thrown out of the house, but was not satisfied until he again made his appearance in the house. Force had to be used and Macinaw was later tied to one of the trees in the yard and left there until the police was notified. He was marched to the city bastille and placed where he could not do damage or disturb other people's peaceful slumbers.

On Thursday morning he was given a hearing in the recorder's office and was sentenced to 30 days. It is now thought that he will be given a chance to move out of town. Macinaw has been employed for some time on the Fifth street sewer by Mihaltn and has been placed in the hands of the police on several occasions on charge of disorderly conduct on the streets.
