## \$189,000 REQUIRED TO PAY CLACKAMAS EXPENSES IN 1907

### LEVY OF EIGHTEEN MILLS ORDERED BY COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' COURT.

### Changes in Boundaries of Road Districts and Much Other Business Occupy First 1907 Session.

The January term of the Clackamas county court has been a busy one, and the present time is taken up looking over the reports of the different road supervisors.

The court has ordered the present east boundary of Road District No. 5, to be established so that now it is a part of Road District No. 6.

In the matter of the petition of the Wollenfer road, the same was approved and the petition turned over to the county board of road viewers.

A saloon license was granted to T. M. Allison in the Boring precinct for a term of six months.

The report of the resurvey of the Oregon City-Milwaukie road was read and placed on file.

Claims against the county were also examined and corrected and the same ordered paid. The appointments of Irving Clarke and George Avery as special deputy sheriffs, without salary, who have been appointed by the sheriff of Clackamas county and approved by him, were confirmed.

W. D. Timley and Ernest Hitchman, who were on the pauper list, have been stricken from the county roll and August Asmus, blind, has been sent to the Guyrup's farm for treatment.

The county court yesterday established a new road district to be known as district No. 40. It is created from portions of the Eagle Creek, Boring and Sandy districts, and is situated just east of Barton.

In the matter of the extension of the boundary of District No. 14, the following were included: the north half of J. S. Howland DLC of section 8, the southwest quarter of northwest quarter of section 9 and were set off from road district No. 39.

From petition of J. A. Byers for change in boundary line between districts No. 3 and 12 it was ordered that part of number 3 be made a part of road district No. 12—that is the part that begins at Baker's bridge and continues to the Clackamas river.

The court finds that \$189,000 will be required and thus will levy a tax of 18 mills and that the same be levied upon each dollar of assessable property—real, personal and mixed of Clackamas county, thus:

### INSPECTOR REID SAYS ENFORCE LAW

A meeting of the fruit growers was held on January 3d in McMinnville, at which James Reid, fruit inspector of Clackamas county, spoke of the value of spraying and the kind of pumps that gave the best results. He was of the opinion that the pressure of the spray pump should be from 110 to 200 pounds to secure best results. He had seen the best results obtained by having a platform over the pump, so that one man could stand on it and spray down, while other men were spraying up. Mr. Reid was strongly in favor of strictly enforcing the law as to sale of infected fruit, either to dealers or to cannerymen. He went on to say that the only safeguard for the fruit industry was to force people to produce a good clean article.

### DUNBAR'S ESTIMATE FOR STATE EXPENSES

One million dollars is the amount to be raised in taxes for carrying on the business and the institutions of the State of Oregon for the next two years, beginning with the first of the year, outlined by Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar. Of this total Multnomah county is supposed to furnish nearly one-half, while Clackamas county is called upon to supply \$34,337.50; 433,500 of which goes for state purposes and \$337.00 to the State Agricultural college.
