The shortage during the year in the Road Fund is \$4783.36 and needs to be remedied in some way and has caused a good deal of worry to the councilmen who are on the finance committee. The trouble seems to be in the fact that the special road levy is far too small each year for the expensive road system within the city limits. Last year the levy was divided into two taxes—3 mill road tax and a 3 mill bridge tax—and as the city is only allowed 60 per cent of the road tax, its share was indeed far too small. This has been the bottom of the whole trouble between the county and the city officials. Some now say that the charter ought to be changed, thus placing the power of levying the road levy within the power of the city and thus remedying this great shortage of \$4783.36.

The city roads are especially expensive to keep in order and during the last year for example, \$1253.60 was spent on Molalla avenue, \$470.20 on Washington street, and a large sum on the Madison street bridge and the lower end of Main street besides the many regular road expenses.

STATE OFFICERS ON FLAT SALARY

The officers of the state of Oregon are now placed on a flat salary and the same went into effect Wednesday morning. This means that all the fees collected by the officials will have to be turned into the state treasury.

From the best information at hand, it appears that under the new law the state Treasurer will turn in fees to the amount of \$4000 a year, this being 1/2 of one per cent on the security bonds held by him for insurance companies. This fee was allowed for collecting this interest for the companies.

The Secretary of State will turn in about \$8000 a year, the fees to this amount being received from notary commissions, certified copies of records, a percentage of the insurance licenses, and the insurance license fees. This will make a total of \$12,000 a year.

The flat salary law also cuts off perquisites to the probable amount of \$5000, making a total of \$17,000.

It does not follow, however, that the state will be \$17,000 better off by reason of the flat salary law. The flat salary law raised the salary of the Governor from \$15000 to \$25000, that of the Secretary of State from \$15000 to \$4500, that of the State Treasurer from \$800 to \$4500 and that of the Attorney-General from \$3000 to \$3600, showing a total increase of \$9800 and leaving an apparent net gain to the state of \$7200.

This gain is more apparent than real, however, for the enactment of this law raising the salaries of the principal state officers has started a demand for a raise in other offices and a movement is on foot to have the present officers relieved of some of the duties they have performed heretofore, because they have received the fees and perquisites paid for the service.
