### PRESIDENT GATCH RESIGNS CHAIR

MID-WINTER MEETING OF ORE-GON AGRICULTURAL COL-LEGE REGENTS.

At the mid-winter meeting of the Oregon Agricultural college regents Wednesday the resignation of President Gatch was accepted. He was unanimously invited to the chair of civies and economies. The board voted to ask the legislature for \$125,000 for a new barn, shops and additions to the administration building. And also for a reappropriation of the \$13,-000 for an eastern Oregon station, lapsed by reason of the referendum, with \$3,000 additional for the same

A report of the executive committee showed that the operation of the eastern Oregon experiment station for the 18 months past has resulted in a profit of more than \$1500.

On account of delayed trains the meeting did not begin until 10 o'clock and ended after midnight. Seven regents were present and Captain Apperson was elected secretary pro tem.
