STEAMBOATS LOADED WITH HAY AND GRAIN

WHARVES AND WAREHOUSES CROWDED WITH FREIGHT AWAITING TRANSPORTATION.

The Oregon City Transportation company has been forced to place in to service a third boat to carry the large amount of freight down the river and Thursday morning the Altona, which has been leased for some time and had been running on the Lewis river, made the first trip up the river. The company has loads of hay waiting for transportation all the way up the river as far as Corvallis, some places there being as much as 400 bales waiting on the transportation company to be carried down to Portland.

The dock and boat house of the Oregon City Transportation company at this place is crowded with the hay shipments that have been brought in during the last few days and the agent had to stop the men from bringing any more for a few days. Albers Bros. have now on the wharf over 20 tons of clear timothy awaiting the arrival of the boats from up the river. The local agent of the transportation company was endeavoring Thursday morning to make room for a large quantity of oats that was expected to arrive from the country at any time. The Altona will no doubt be kept on this run for some time as it is said there are 11,000 bales of hops between Oregon City and Corvallis awaiting transportation facilities. Shipping is very slow as the water is very low. Near Corvallis the water is only 2 feet 10 inches and the boats draw from 14 to 18 inches of water.

BIG INCREASE IN POSTAL RECEIPTS

OREGON CITY POSTOFFICE GAINED 27 PER CENT LAST YEAR OVER 1905.

Business Doubled in Some Divisions of the Money Order Department—Comparison of the Figures.

Postmaster Randall has just finished his annual report of the work of the Money Order department of the post office at Oregon City which shows an enormous gain in the amount of business done during the year.

This report of course shows a corresponding gain in the amount of people doing business in this city and it is worth noticing, especially by those who harp upon the string that Oregon City is at a standstill.

During the last year the postal business has increased 27 per cent, viz: for the year 1905, \$10,788.65, and in 1906, \$13,771.43.

In 1905 there were 8973 domestic money orders issued which amounted to the sum of \$54,289.08, while in 1906, 9420 were issued for an amount of \$63,107.95.

The domestic money orders paid out also show a very substantial gain over the preceding year as in 1905 only 6594 were paid out amounting to \$63,991.04, and in 1906 there were 6673 amounting to \$67,133.85.

The greatest gain in the post office department is in the international money orders issued and in this department the receipts of 1906 were more than double those of the preceding year—in 1905 there were 129 issued amounting to \$2137.20, and in 1906, 215 issued amounting to \$4,999.24.

Although there were more of the international money orders paid the past year than during the year 1905, the amount shows some decrease, as follows: in 1905, 44 were paid amounting to \$1724.54, and last year 64 amounting to \$1049.98.

C. P. PHONE LINES INTO OREGON CITY

President George Randall reports things booming with the Central Point telephone company. They have just added nine new subscribers and have three linemen at work bringing the line into Oregon City. They have been coming in on the Frank Andrews line at Mt. Pleasant, but are now cutting off from it. They are also extending the line into New Era where they connect with the flouring mill.

IMPROVEMENT OF MADISON STREET.

The residents along Madison street north of Seventh street are nearly united for the improvement of that street clear through to the Madison street bridge. The improvement of this street would render the property along Madison street more valuable and would give the residents one of the best streets in the city. It would be a great boon to the people who reside in the Kansas City addition and would give them the best possible means of reaching the business district of upper Seventh street.

This subject has been taken up since the talk or proposal of the opening up of Washington street, north and south, from one side of the town to the other.

The opening up of Madison street, the residents say, is a more feasible plan, as the street could be improved at a lower cost and the grades would be easier for the traveling public.

No definite plan of action has been taken by the residents along the street, but so strong is the sentiment that there is no doubt that some move will be made in the near future.

It is planned to macadamize only the 24 or 30 feet of the center of the street and to sod and park the sides, except at street intersections where the full width would be improved. If the work is carried out on those plans, Madison will be a very handsome residence street as well as furnishing a much needed highway from Kansas City to Upper Seventh street.

LEGISLATURE WILL INVESTIGATE LOCKS.

Salem, Jan. 24.—Upon motion of Senator Miller of Linn, the committee on commerce and navigation has been instructed to investigate the history, cost and present condition of the locks at Oregon City and their effect upon the commercial and industrial interests of the state. The committee was asked to report at as early a date as convenient.
