

FORMER FLOODS WERE VERY MUCH GREATER

HIGH WATERS OF 1861 AND 1890 OF HISTORIC INTEREST.

MANY BUILDINGS CARRIED AWAY

The Flood of 1861-2 Was Remarkable For Number of Buildings Washed Away.

The angry, surging flood of the past week carrying devastation in its wake was a tame thing compared with the high waters of 1861-2 and 1890, according to the stories of the oldest inhabitants. When the big flood of 1861-2 came it wiped out the mills and residences of Lynn City, a flourishing town that was built on the rocks and ground space now occupied by the locks canal and paper mills. The enterprising little West Side town was entirely washed away and never rebuilt.

E. D. Kelly, who carried on a prosperous hotel business in the building just north of the Cliff House on Main street and still standing, states that the water stood three feet on the ground floor. A brick building that stood opposite on the present woolen mill site used as a wholesale general merchandise store by Abernethy & Co. and another 2-story brick in the same block was carried away by the raging volumes of water, as also was the old McLoughlin flouring mill built in Hudson Bay times.

The flood of 1861-2 was evidently the most severe that ever visited Oregon City, although there was less property to be destroyed at that time.

Mrs. Mary La Forrest says that the site of the falls was completely obliterated and a swift smooth body of water flowed over the jagged precipice that has made the falls of the Willamette famous. Captain Taylor and three other adventurous spirits rowed over the falls in a small boat and were applauded by the population.

Mrs. La Forest says that the high water reached the dwelling of Christopher C. Babcock in the north end of town, at the northwest corner of Twelfth and Washington streets, and residents of the dwellings on the lower ground were rescued by a steamboat. One woman that lived in a house on the site of the Lynch cottages, stepped from her upstairs window onto the deck of the boat.

The flood was evidently higher and more disastrous in its effects than the high water of 1890. The high water of the latter date reached as far up as Barlow's grocery store, and a large log was left stranded in the street near the Bank of Oregon City. Several buildings were carried away but the loss did not come up to that of 1861-2.

PUMPING STATION IN GOOD CONDITION

PLENTIFUL SUPPLY OF WATER FOR ALL DESIRED PURPOSES.

The pump of the city water works was put into running order Friday night and about 11 o'clock the water began to work into the mains of the city. Some trouble was experienced at first in getting enough pressure

worked up as many of the residents had left their faucets open. The result was that many of the houses in the city were flooded during the night. Early in the morning of Saturday the reservoir was turned loose into the mains to supply the city while the new belt was being placed on the wheel at the station.

Everything worked in good condition although when started up there was several inches of water over the floor of the station. The filters are also working and the water which is being supplied is in good condition. As soon as it can be done conveniently the filters will be thoroughly overhauled and the water will be somewhat clearer than it is at the present time. The people of this city can now appreciate how necessary water is to a community and it is hoped they will not leave the faucets open when water is not needed, and waste it unnecessarily.

The board of water commissioners have studied the problem now before them and are now certain that the pump will be able to supply the city with water for some weeks at least. When the river begins to fall more trouble and worry will confront them as it is feared that the waters will not feed the supply flumes. However the river will have to fall many feet before that stage is reached.

TAXES COMING IN AT A STEADY RATE

COMMISSIONERS' COURT HAS ADJOURNED BUT CALL SESSION TO BE HELD NEXT WEEK.

The sheriff's office is by far the busiest place in the court house. Inquiries concerning taxes are coming thick and fast. The rebate can be secured until the 15th of March and the following two weeks taxes will stand at a flat rate. The sheriff has stated that there would be an addition of 10 per cent after that and 1 per cent added each following month. When the taxes have finally become delinquent, the owner of the property is forced to pay an addition of 16 per cent and the cost of publication.

The county court finished all important business on Friday afternoon and Commissioners Lewellen and Killin, returned to their homes. The court is subject to a call from the county judge at any time. It may meet next week to look over the damage done to the bridges and roads during the flood. The Clear Creek bridge which was reported entirely washed away by one of the residents of that part of the county, has temporarily been fixed and travel has been resumed on that road.

HAVE GOOD COPPER PROPERTIES SOUTH

Thomas Pankey of Clackamas Heights and H. Tracy of Estacada, returned Friday from Josephine county, where they have been doing development work on a promising copper ledge located on Pickett creek near Merlin. The ledge varies from six to 18 feet in width and carries tested values of \$23 to the ton in copper. W. A. Hyelman, the Estacada banker, also is an interested owner in the mine. Messrs. Pankey and Tracy expect to return to Josephine county early in March to continue development work on the property. The owners of the property are confident that they have big things in sight, and will investigate the extent of the mine.

MORE SIDEWALKS BADLY NEEDED

At the council meeting Wednesday night were brought up communications from the carriers of the city mail delivery in which they called attention to the condition of the sidewalks, streets and street crossings.

In many places there are no sidewalks at all and the carriers are forced to wade in the mud ankle deep or retrace their steps in order to deliver the mail. The letters before the council were from two of the city carriers and enumerated the places on which sidewalks, crossings, etc., were badly needed. Sidewalks are badly needed on parts of Water street and some of the alleys in the business section. Abernethy street is in dire need of a sidewalk near 18th street, and the west side of J. Adams, between Sixth and Seventh, and the east side of Monroe, between Fourth and Third

also need the attention of the street committee.

Some of the streets in this city have no names, and there is no system of numbering of the houses in Green Point, and there is no provision made for locating and numbering houses in alleys. These conditions make the delivery of the city mails a very hard and tedious task.

MAYOR WILL NAME CHARTER COMMISSION

Mayor Caulfield will not announce the ten appointees to be made on the charter commission until the special meeting of the council to be held on February 20th, as some of the members of the legislature, who are members of that commission by virtue of the provisions of the resolution would be unable to attend their duties in the matter until after the adjournment at Salem.

The commission is to consist of 25 members, including the nine members of the city council, the three members of the water commission, the mayor, city attorney and recorder, and the other ten members will be selected from the taxpayers and residents of Oregon City.

Herman Leisman was appointed administrator of the estate of Henry Deckman Saturday. The estate is valued at \$936.

Minnie M. Houghton as plaintiff has brought suit for divorce against Eugene Houghton. The two were married April 5, 1900, but in 1905 the defendant deserted the woman against her wishes.

DROWNED MAN IS IDENTIFIED

Dispatch was received by W. W. H. Samson of this city Saturday morning telling of drowning of John L. Stewart. Mr. Samson delivered telegram to family. Deceased leaves wife and 10 children living at Stone. Body will be brought to this city. Stewart was drowned near Arlington in February 8 in Wood Gulch creek. Up to this time his family had not been located.

O. R. & N. TRAIN HELD BY TWO LANDSLIDES

One Hundred Persons Imprisoned—Alkali Creek Goes On Costly Rampage.

Special to Daily Star. Arlington, Or., Feb. 9.—News has just been received that train No. 2, made up at The Dalles is caught between two landslides six miles west of here. There are 100 persons on the train, and it will be at least 10 hours before the train can proceed. Alkali creek flowing through here has flooded the whole town, overturned two barns and ruined the foundations of many houses. Damage is estimated to be at least \$100,000. A section of the city water main was broken and the city water is shut off. No mail here from west of The Dalles for 7 days.
