# TELLS ABOUT 23 DECE RESOLUTION

F. M. Gill Gives Particulars of Recent Pomona Grange Incident

#### IT WAS NOT DISCUSSED

Laid on Table Without Debate, He Seconding Motion-Important Action Overlooked in Newspaper Reports.

To the Editor :-

Considerable has been said in different papers about the Gill resolution at the Pomona grange at Logan, Wednesday of just week. I believe no effort will be made by the grangers of this county to circulate the petitions calling the referendum on the circular letter and petitions were on the table of the secretary, but I did not see any one take any of them.

The resolution which I introduced merely stated as follows:

Resolved, that it is the sense of the Clackamas District Pomona Grange that we do not favor the calling of the referendum upon the University of Oregon appropriation, believing it to be unwise, and

Be it further resolved, that we favor the Normal school question and University question being made the subject of an initiative measure.

This is the wording according to my recollection of it.

The committee on resolutions, consisting of Beard of Maple Lane, Grisenthwaite of Central and Borland of Oswego granges, reportd the resolution with the recommendation that it be laid on the table. 
