WILLAMETTE FALLS POWER FOR SALEM

TRANSMISSION LINE TO BE BUILT FROM HERE TO CAPITAL CITY.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power company announces that it will construct a transmission line to carry electricity from its Oregon City station to Salem and it will be built this summer. The estimated cost is nearly \$60,000.

The company has a surplus of power since the completion of the Cazadero plant.

Salem and vicinity now depend on electricity manufactured by a steam plant with the exception of some power from a Silverton station where water is available during a part of the year only.

This is a long way to transmit power, as it is nearly 40 miles from Oregon City to Salem by the route the line will follow, but it has been found by the company that power can be carried that distance with a small loss.

SUIT IS QUICKER THAN RR RED TAPE

Robert T. Linney has brought suit by his attorney, H. T. Cross, against the Oregon & California R. R. company to quiet title to 40 acres of land over by Sandy. The forty is a part of 200 acres recently bought by Linney of James Fegles for \$4000. The land was originally sold by the railroad company to Victor Tabordan, but deeds cannot be found. The company acknowledges it has no inter-

est in the land, but this suit is a quicker way to remove the cloud than to go through the endless red tape of getting another deed from the railroad company and the interested eastern trust company.

Linney is connected with the Mt. Hood railway and power company that proposes to build an electric line from Portland to Mt. Hood. This land was acquired for that project.
