# ABOLISH PRINCIPAL

## Board of Directors Do Away With Office At Barclay School

## ACCEPTS BETTER OFFER

### Mrs. Emilie Shaw Will Be Principal of Milwaukie School—Election and Annual Meeting Today.

The board of directors of Oregon City school district has abolished the office of principal of the Barclay building in the interests of discipline. The action, it is freely acknowledged by the board, is due to trouble that has arisen in the past owing to conflict of authority between the city superintendent of schools and the principal of the Barclay school. There seems to have been no friction between the superintendent and the principal of the Eastham school.

Under the new dispensation the superintendent will also be principal of the Barclay school. It is the talk, Monday, among the patrons that the board's order clears the way for the re-engagement of Mrs. Godfrey as a high school teacher.

The board originally set June 12 as the date for election of teachers, then postponed until June 15. It is stated that the board met Sunday but no teachers were elected and it is announced they will be elected tonight after the school meeting.

Mrs. Emilie Shaw, who was principal of the Eastham school during the last year, did not apply for re-election and has accepted the principalship of the Milwaukie school at a salary of \$10 a month higher than she received here.

Six others of last year's teachers have not re-applied for positions: Misses Turner, Broetz, Antonette Walden, Nellie M. Stevens, Lill Schmidt and Gertrude Neffger. Miss Stevens will teach at St. Johns and two of the others in West Oregon City, for larger salaries than they received here.

The annual school election is being held in Oregon City district Monday afternoon. Voting on one director and on the proposition for a Union high school is proceeding in the Fountain firehouse. A light vote is being polled. There is no opposition to the re-election of George A. Harding as director, and the sentiment in regard to the high school is all one way in this district.

The annual school meeting will be held in the county court room at 7:30 tonight when the annual reports of the board of directors and clerk will be submitted. In the other districts Mt. Pleasant, Canemah, Willamette Falls, West Oregon City and Park-place the vote on the Union high school will be taken at the annual meetings held in the respective districts tonight.

If the Union high school proposition is defeated, as now seems probable owing to the feeling in Park-place, there is a disposition on the part of the board to add another grade this year to the Barclay high school and another the year following which would mean a full high school course of four years. If the eleventh grade is added, Superintendent McKee says all of this year's class will return for another year.
