CABIN IS DESTROYED

Parkplace Men Lose Personal Effects in Early Morning Fire at Cazadero.

QUICK WORK OF FLAMES

No Time To Save Even Their Clothing—Edward Himler Has Narrow Escape From Burning.

W. W. Smith, Henry Heurth and Ed Himler of Parkplace, employed in building troughs for the new salmon hatchery above Cazadero, lost their clothing, bedding and other personal belongings by a fire that burned their cabin at 2 o'clock Wednesday morning. They had to borrow clothes in which to come to their homes.

Himler was sleeping in the cabin but the other two men were in a tent a short distance from the cabin door. A stove in the cabin had contained fire early in the evening and a lamp had been lighted, but both had been cold for hours and the origin of the fire is a mystery. Himler was awakened by the fire crackling on either side of him. He rushed to the door and shouted to the other men. The cabin was lined with tarred paper and the structure burned with great rapidity, the men having time to bring out only two suit cases.

Mr. Smith, who is a deputy fish warden, lost valuable papers and all lost their clothing. Himler had a \$20 and a \$5 gold piece. These were found in the ashes melted into one lump.

Prizes are offered for largest family, best teams, etc. The exercises in the park include oration by Hon. C. M. Idleman, reciting of Declaration of Independence by Miss Watts, solo by Mrs. Brodie, chorus singing by combined choirs, music by the bands, etc.

The horse races will be held on South Main street at 2 o'clock. There will be five races, wet test. The foot races, fat men's race, hurdle races and other land sports will be held on North Main street. The motor boat race will be pulled off in the forenoon, while the other boat and swimming races will follow the land sports. Daylight fire works both forenoon and afternoon and a grand display of the fire kind at 8 p. m. on the hill just north of the west entrance to the bridge.

The O. W. P. and Home Telephone Co. promised to have Main street in as good condition as possible—bricks and barrels removed and street swept.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE

ADOPT RESOLUTION INDORSING MOVE TO COMPEL RAILWAY TO SELL ITS LAND.

The movement to compel the Southern Pacific to sell its land in Oregon occupied a large share of the session of the Willamette Valley Development League at Cottage Grove Wednesday. Resolutions were adopted indorsing the movement.

B. F. Hawley in the course of his address, gave a review of the various grants, referring to that which reverted to the Oregon & California Railroad, with the direct understanding the company was to sell it to settlers for not more than \$2.50 an acre. J. U. Campbell of Oregon City, and Prof. F. G. Young, of Eugene, spoke on industrial and economic con-

ditions, and their remarks were well received.

Colonel Hofer of Salem was re-elected president of the league.

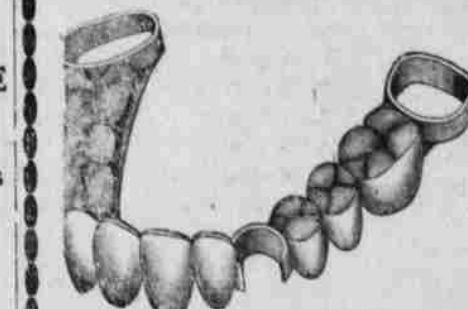
