

# SAYS CROPS ARE LIGHT

Clackamas County Man Writes of Conditions in Sacramento Valley

One Lumber Company Owns Timber Land Tract Fourteen Miles Long by Two Miles Wide.

Greenwood, Calif., July 4.

Here are some items from one of your correspondents who is taking a little tour through southern Oregon and California. The trip so far has been pleasant—only one incident that was a little exciting. Just as we met a train on a siding the engine and two cars of the other train jumped the track near Edgewood, which detained us six hours. Had to send for a wrecking train.

The country in general looks quite prosperous though in the Sacramento valley crops are rather light. San Francisco still looks like a bad wreck, though they are building up but not with the vim that is going on at Portland and vicinity.

Coming up the coast through Sonoma county about Santa Rosa everything looks neat and prosperous, crops, farms and all. From there to this place in Mendocino county is mountainous and rough. Once in a while nice little valleys, lumber country mostly. The famous redwood abounds here at Greenwood. The C. S. Smith Lumber company owns up and down the coast two miles by fourteen. J. H. Shibley is superintendent of the farming department—keeps 1000 head of cattle and over, and other products on the farm in proportion.

As they did not have any celebration here, I cannot refrain from saying something about our National birthday. I want to remind the readers of this article that the birth of this nation is undoubtedly Providential. We will notice the fact in our national history that when a leader was needed towards liberty and freedom, he was on hand. 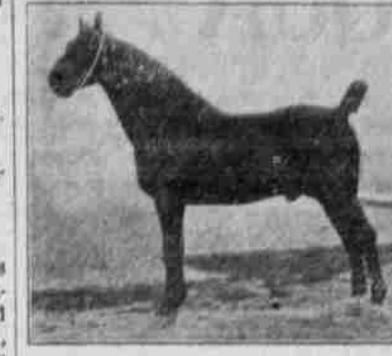
