TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

Corinne Powers, daughter of Sheriff Powers of Columbia county, was arrested at Spokane yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff W. A. Daley, of Colfax, on the charge of larceny, and was taken to the Whitman county jail last night. She worked two weeks at Colfax in the A. C. Warner family and it is charged stole therefrom clothing of the woman and a suitcase. It was also learned that she went to a store and ordered a quantity of dress goods amounting to about \$15 and had it charged to Mrs. Warner. Sheriff Powers of Dayton, was notified of the arrest but he declined to do anything for the girl, saying she was beyond his control. She is 19 years of age.

The telegraph operators' strike has spread to nearly all the big cities of the West and includes both companies. It may result in the general paralysis of telegraph service in a day or two. All operators of both companies at Chicago strike. Almost every operator out at Kansas City, Denver, Salt Lake, New Orleans, Topeka, Dallas, Fort Worth and Helena. Operators at St. Louis, St. Paul, Omaha, Portland and Indianapolis await orders from President Small before striking. New York operators, numbering 3,000, meet Sunday to decide on action. Bad faith on the part of the Western Union is charged by the operators.

Mike McDonald, long known as the king of gamblers, is dead in Chicago, leaving an estate of several millions to be fought over by two wives. His

first wife ran away with a priest, and McDonald embraced the Jewish faith to marry his second, who will be tried in October for murdering her paramour. McDonald returned to the Catholic faith before he died.

The works of Horatio Alger, Jr., the noted writer of books for boys, have been barred from the shelves of the Worcester (Mass.) public library. Alger is now in the same class as Mark Twain, Robert W. Chambers, Walt Whitman and other well-known producers of literature, some of whose works have been barred from free public libraries in Worcester county towns and cities. At the library the reason given for barring Alger's books is that they are not truthful and are too sensational.

Theodore V. Halsey, on trial at San Francisco for bribery, is dying from appendicitis. An operation was performed but the appendix was found in a gangrenous state and there is little or no hope of his recovery.

The Mississippi Democratic state committee has officially declared John Sharp Williams the nominee for U. S. senator, he having a majority of 648 votes over Governor Vardaman.
