

BOARD FOR NEW HOME

Arrives and Will be Installed Within Thirty Days in Andresen Building.

EMPLOY 8 OPERATORS

Number On Duty At Beginning— Claimed There Will Be At Least 300 Subscribers.

The switch boards for the Home Telephone company's Oregon City exchange has arrived in this city and will be installed as soon as an expert arrives from the East.

The board is manufactured by the Strongberg-Carlson company, one of the best known firms in this line, and is of three position type. It is constructed in such a manner that if, at any time there should be a need of a larger board, another section can be added to it without much trouble.

A force of eight girls will be employed at the beginning. The local managers say that the switchboard will be installed in the office in the Andresen block within 30 days, and the phones will then be installed in the residences and business houses as soon as possible.

When the new system is installed, there will be at least 300 subscribers, and according to officials, a great many more.

The phones will be similar in construction to those recently installed by the Pacific Telephone company.

A number of farmer lines will connect with the local exchange.

BUYERS COMPLAIN.

Wool buyers continue to complain

that the wool of the Willamette Valley gets coarser. This is due, if true, to the increasing predominance of Cotswold blood in the sheep of this valley and to a disregard of coarseness of wool by many of the Cotswold breeders. The more prominent Cotswold breeders of the valley have bred so as to avoid excessive coarseness, but others have paid no attention to this, and while the climatic and food conditions of the valley give wool a fine luster, they seem to tend to coarseness of fiber.

The Lincolns are now getting quite a foothold in the Willamette Valley, and as their wool is not as coarse as that of the Cotswolds, their growing popularity may in time have the effect of making the average valley wool some finer than it now is. The Rambouillets, which are now coming in to some extent, will of course reduce greatly the coarseness of the wool in all flocks into which their blood enters. The Cotswolds have gained their popularity because they have proved so well adapted to the climatic conditions of the valley and are at the same time pretty good mutton sheep and heavy yielders of wool.—Agriculturist.
