THE PACIFIC FLEET ARRIVES ON COAST

The first division of the Pacific fleet, foreguard of the American Navy which is to assemble in Pacific Coast waters by orders of the President, steamed through the Golden Gate at San Francisco at sunrise Friday. The four armored cruisers passed the heads in file formation, led by the flagship West Virginia, flying at her masthead the two-starred flag of the commander of the fleet, Rear-Admiral James H. Dayton. Five hundred yards to the rear came the Colorado, followed at like distance by the Maryland and the Pennsylvania. The arrival of the four big sister ships marks the end of a 36,000-mile cruise, which began at Newport, R. I., last September.

BONAPARTE TALKS ABOUT BAD CASES

THINKS CONVICTION WILL FOLLOW PROSECUTION IN OREGON IN NOVEMBER.

Attorney-General Bonaparte, who returned to Washington last week received a report from Frances Heney, Jr., briefly summarizing his recent conference with District Attorney Bristol, and in this report it is intimated that the Oregon land cases will not go to trial until November. Whether Mr. Bristol will prosecute any of the cases is not stated, but Mr. Heney expects to go back to Portland in November, when he says the trials will be resumed and the calendar cleared. In several cases the defendants will plead guilty. In a few others the Government will move to quash the indictments and not bring the defendants to bar. But the remainder will be submitted on evidence, including the cases of Binger Hermann and John Hall.

Mr. Bonaparte said that so far as he was advised, none of the defendants were clamoring for trial. "Some of them have been demanding that their indictments be set aside but that is the only demand we have had from them," he said. When asked how Mr. Bristol's status would be affected if the trials were not concluded by December the Attorney-General said he could throw no light on that subject. He did not know whether it was the President's intention to reappoint Mr. Bristol or select another District Attorney. That matter, he said, was entirely in the hands of the President.

Asked if he thought there was any politics in the repeated postponement of the land trials, he replied: "Not so far as the Department is concerned." It has been authoritatively stated that Secretary Garfield and Land Commissioner Ballinger have repeatedly urged both Mr. Heney and Mr. Bristol to hurry up the land fraud trials. We want to get them out of the way." From this it would appear that Mr. Heney and Mr. Bristol have the entire say as to when the trials shall be conducted and whatever program they wish will be accepted by the Department in Washington.
