To Frost Glass.

Wash the glass over with a hot saturated solution of epsom salts, or sal ammoniac, or bluestone, containing as much of the salt as the water will dissolve. The solution must be applied hot with a brush.

Bath Water.

The water used in the bath should be softened either with borax or blcarbonate of soda; even ammonia will be effective, but of all three it is better to use too little than too much.

Whey Bread.

Heat sour milk, strain out the whey, use whey instead of water or milk. Use the other ingredients same as when using water or milk. The bread will always be nice, and is much more easily digested.

Restoring Lace.

Lace may be cleaned satisfactorily and will dye equally well. Of course, white will take any color preferred, as well as black. Dark-colored laces de not, as a rule, take a good black, but may be restored to their original tone and will look like new.

Salted Peanuts

Take any quantity of raw peanuts in shell, and then pour bolling water over them. Let stand for few minutes when the skins can all be removed, leaving nuts white. Place in pan, salt and butter, and roast as coffee in oven until a nice brown. Are almost as nice to serve as salted almonds, and can be kept for long time in closed jar.

To Whiten the Skin.

After you have washed and dried your face carefully, apply the following lotion: One quart of water previously boiled and strained, thirty drops of alcohol, one ounce oxide of zinc, eight grains of bichloride of mercury, twenty drops of glycerin.
