A LETTER FROM "BOBS."

From England's Field Marshal. John Shannon, of this city, is the

proud possessor of a gift from Field Marshal Lord Roberts, well known to all newspaper readers as "Bobs." Mr. Shannon is a veteran of the East Indian Wars, and served in the campaign of Delhi and Lucknow, in 1857 and 1858. He was awarded a medal, which he wears on state ocasions, and some time ago wrote to Lord Roberts, briefly rehearsing his part in quelling the East Indian mutiny, and asking for a new ribbon on which to hang the medal. Mr. Shannon was surprised and gratified to receive a few days ago a letter from the Field Marshal, accompanied by the ribbon and also a late photograph of the most distin-guished officer in the British Army. The letter follows:

Englemere, Ascot, Berks, 25 Feb. 1908. Sir: I was very glad to receive your letter of the 5th inst, and am much obliged for it. I wish you could have been present with us on the occasion of the mutiny banquet at the Albert Hall on the 23d of December. It was a great collection of old soldiers, and I think they were all order of the Honorable Grant B. Dim- much gratified with the reception they them in coming and returning to their

respective homes. I think you and I were born the same year, 1832, and we both belonged to the East India Company's service. I was born in the First Bengal Fusileers, when my father commanded the regiment and I was glad to

serve alongside of it in 1857. I send you seme of the Indian Mutiny medal ribbon you asked for and also a photograph of myself, which you may like to keep.

GROWERS ARE DISCOURAGED Not More Than 50 Per Cent. of the

Hop Acreage Is Cultivated. The general hop conditions on the Pacific Coast have discouraged the growers of Clackamas County to the extent that probably 50 per cent of the acreage that was in cultivation last year is still untouched. It is estimated by W. S. Hurst, of Aurora, that half of the acreage is being cared for, but 25 per cent, will not be cultivated at all, but will be abandoned and plowed up. Mr. Hurst also estimates that 25 per cent, of the acreage remains uncultivated by growers who are waiting to see what direction the market will take and they may cultivate later. Many of the growers have not purchased their twine and other supplies, and it would not be surprising to see the hop crop of Clackamas County fall short fully 40 per cent. of last year's figures. A majority of the Clackamas growers did not take kindly to the hop combine that was proposed several months ago and declined to enter the association.
