ESTACADA, May 24.—(Editor Enterprise)—Much discussion about the county high school has been had the past few weeks. I do not favor the county high school proposition. The thing is gotten up simply to build a high school at Oregon City and to get the farmers to help keep it up.
But it is not going to help the farmer in proportion to the tax he will have to pay for its support.
I believe in union high schools. These can be constructed at points throughout the county where they will be within reach of all the people.
Some of our educational reformers wish to go farther than the people are willing to go. Because the union high school vote failed at Oregon City, these people are not willing to wait and educate the people up to the union high school idea; but that will come, and the discussion of these subjects will bring them about.
Mr. Schuebel, in discussing the

county high school proposition at Estacada to about 15 voters, said that the citizens of Estacada ought to vote for the proposition because they would get the money paid by George, Garfield, Eagle Creek, Springwater, Highland and other outlying districts as taxes. In other words we would bleed the farmers of these districts to benefit the high school at Estacada. Of course, if he spoke at Highland he would sing another song. Do you, citizens of these outlying districts, propose to bleed for the benefit of the populous centers? I think not. Then vote "no" to the county high school and save your tax money for a high school near enough to you to do you some good.

UNDER LOCAL OPTION

Lane County has local option prohibition and its citizens hold at present forty-three Government licenses.

Linn County has local option prohibition and its citizens hold at present forty-four Government liquor licenses.

Clackamas County has licensed saloons and its citizens hold thirty one Government liquor licenses.

Now which County had the largest number of criminal cases during the last year? Look at the Court expenses of each county, and say for yourself. Take two counties of equal size, Clackamas County and Lane County. The running expenses of Clackamas County during the past year was \$35, 179.61. The running expenses of Lane County during the past year was \$71, 153.11. (See Secretary of State's report printed in the Oregonian of April 15th, 1908.)

In Lane County, a local option County, for running expenses it costs their taxpayers more than twice the amount of the running expenses of Clackamas County, where retail liquor license law is in force. It cost the tax payers of Linn County \$4000.00 to secure one conviction, thirteen trials with verdicts of "Not guilty," in 47 days and one of conviction. The farmers are compelled to pay their share of this unnecessary litigation. The druggists and lawyers wax rich in prohibition counties, but the tax payer pays the expense.
