ABOLISH RURAL DELIVERY. Postoffice Department Says Good Reads Must Be Kept Up.

Not only Clackamas County, but other portions of the country as well, may lose a part of its rural free delivery system this winter, unless the roads are placed in good condition for travel during the rainy weather. The postoffice department is conducting a campaign for good roads and several months ago obtained from Postmaster Randall a statement of the condition of the roads in Clackamas County, showing just what portions are in first-class shape, covered with plank or crushed rock, and also the parts that are in need of repair. Upon receipt of this report, the department sent circular letters to the road supervisors calling their attenion to the fact that portions of the roads should be placed in order before Winter, and intimating that in case of neglect, the rural service might be discontinued in certain districts where the roads were not up to the standard.

The birds were eager to depart and mounted to a height of probably 1900 feet, they were out of sight in a minute. Mr. McBain hopes the pigeons will reach Oakland in time to break the record between Oregon City and Oakland, which is five days. He has had birds fly 200 miles in three hours and 47 minutes, and as the air sine distance from Oregon City to Oakland is about 500, the birds should have no difficulty under favorable conditions, in making the trip in record time.
