**Sixteen Precincts are Dry.**

The county court has decreed Prohibition in the precincts of Beaver Creek, Bull Run, Boring, Canby, Canemah, Damascus, Eagle Creek, Estacada, Highland, Molalla, Marquam, Maple Lane, Milk Creek, Oregon City No. 3, Springwater and Viola, under the vote taken at the general election June 1, last, when all of these precincts voted dry. After July 1, 12 o'clock, there will be no liquor sold in any of these places. The vote shuts out six saloons from the precincts of Estacada and Boring.
