MANAGEMENT OF HOME COMPANY GOES INTO THE HANDS OF OREGON CITY MEN.

AFTER MORE BUSINESS

Retains Corporate Name of Oregon City and Farmers Independent Telephone Company With Many Outside Connections.

The management of the Home Telephone Company in Oregon City has been localized, with a view of creating local support in behalf of the company and increasing its business.

The local system, the outgrowth of the organization of the Oregon City and Farmers Independent Telephone Company, which was formed here about two years ago with the primary purpose of giving the farmers of Clackamas County connection with Oregon City, and later with Portland and the outside world.

TELEPHONES AT OAK GROVE. New Company Formed With Standard Equipment and Central System.

An important telephone deal has just been completed in the organization of the Oak Grove Telephone Company, with a capital stock of \$4000, divided into 400 shares at \$10 per share.

The Oak Grove company is to have the exclusive privilege of operating telephones in the following territory, with the exception of such instruments as the Pacific Company may already have in operation.

GRANGE FORMS COMPANY. Multnomah Fair at Gresham to Be Annual Institution.

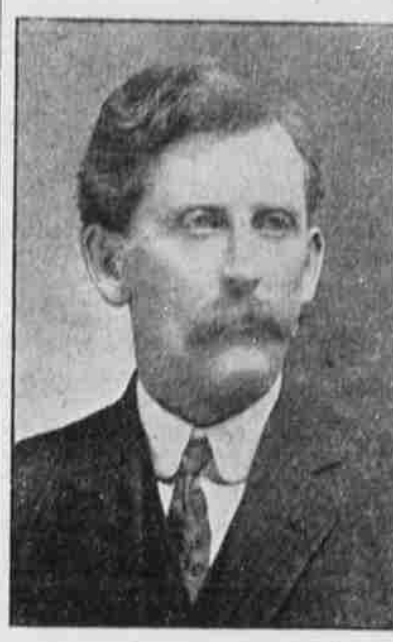
The Grange Fair Association will be the name of the Multnomah County Agricultural Exposition, to be held at Gresham every year hereafter as a permanent institution.

GRADE WORK MAPPED OUT

CITY SUPERINTENDENT MCKEE HAS OUTLINED COURSE OF STUDY FOR HIGH SCHOOL.

OPENS IN SEPTEMBER

Two Years Work in Latin Will Be Required and Addition to Eastham Building Will Provide Necessary Space.

As near as can be ascertained at this time prospects for success of the new 4-graded high school will look exceedingly bright when the term opens September 21.

The four years of high school work will admit the graduate to the University of Oregon or any institution of equal standing without examination, credits being allowed for each branch.

Three years work will be given during the coming year and in 1909 the 12th grade will be added to the course, which is based upon five recitations a week for each subject for the length of time assigned.

When the 4-room addition to the Eastham building is completed, some rearrangements of grammar grades will be necessary but these have not yet been determined by the board of directors.

MORE STUDY ROOM IN CITY SCHOOLS

PLANS SUBMITTED FOR 4-ROOM ADDITION TO EASTHAM SCHOOL BUILDING.

The plans and specifications for the 4-room addition to the Eastham School building were Tuesday afternoon presented by Architect White to the board of directors and were approved with the modification of eliminating the basement.

Bonds will be issued to cover the cost of the addition. The directors have been authorized to issue bonds in the amount of \$3000, and at the suggestion of Dr. W. E. Carll, chairman of the board, the bonds will be in the small denominations of \$200, to enable small investors to place their money in a local interest bearing project.

Miss Marjorie Caulfield was elected a teacher in the city schools. She was formerly engaged in the Eastham building, but for the last two years has been an instructor in the Pendleton schools and is elected at Ashland.

The contract for painting the Barclay building was awarded to Thompson and Whittier, the lowest bidder. Their figure was \$487. Knowland & Coffey's bid was \$500, and that of S. S. Walker was \$598.50.

Kindling Material. Melt 1 pound of resin, add 2 ounces of tallow, and while all are not still thick with pine sawdust. While still warm spread about 1 inch thick upon boards thickly covered with sawdust to prevent sticking. When cold break into pieces about 1 inch square. One of these pieces will easily ignite with a match and burn long enough and with a strong blaze to ignite any wood fit to burn.
