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WHITNEY BOISE MAY BE AN EMBEZZLER

ARRESTED IN PORTLAND ON A CHARGE OF MISAPPROPRIATING FUNDS OF HAWTHORNE ESTATE.

Whitney I. Boise, charged with embezzling funds belonging to the Hawthorne estate while acting as its agent, declined to discuss his arrest or the criminal charge that has been preferred against him.

What the aggregate of Mr. Boise's shortage of the funds of the estate is declared by the heirs to be \$135,000. This total, it is said, will be increased by further investigations by Mr. Boise's managing the property, instances of which have been reported since his arrest last Saturday afternoon.

This investigation revealed the fact that Mr. Boise did not keep complete records of the business of the estate. For that reason, proof of the alleged squandering of the estate funds had to be gathered from persons outside of those concerned directly in the property.
