

PEOPLE OF CLACKAMAS WANT BETTER SCHOOLS

Progressiveness in educational lines has struck Clackamas County with a rapid hand and in almost every section school buildings are being constructed or enlarged, new grades established, more teachers employed and high school facilities provided.

The district boundary board held a meeting this week and re-established a district between Upper and Lower Logan. This district was formerly known as No. 94, and lapsed a few years ago. The building and apparatus are intact and the only thing necessary to be done is place the structure in order, engage a teacher and open the school. Some of the residents of that section have to send their children three or four miles to school over rough roads in winter, and the leading men of the district have promised County Superintendent Gary to levy a special tax to assist in supporting the school.

In Estacada there will be a 4-grade high school established this fall, and Professor H. M. James, of Milan, Michigan, has been engaged as principal at a salary of \$100 per month. Last year only \$70 was paid and three teachers employed. Thomas D. Minor was recently elected principal, but de-

clined to go to Eastern Oregon, and Mr. James was secured. It is the intention of the Estacada people to swell the attendance of the school, by trying to get the children of the territory adjacent to the town to attend the high school, and the tuition fees may meet the additional expense of the higher grades. A good school spirit is being shown and residents of the Eastern Clackamas town hope to build up a school second to none of its size. The grade teachers are Stella Womer, Eva Pruner and Mae Stevens.

The contract for the construction of a four-room addition to the Eastham building in Oregon City will be let Friday night. Every attempt will be made to have this work completed in time for the opening of the Fall term of school, September 21.

On Monday, September 7, the district boundary board will hold its last meeting until next April, and all pending matters must be settled at that time, or be laid over until next Spring. The board on Tuesday denied the petition for the creation of a new district to be formed out of the territory of Browns, Phelps and Mundorffs. It was feared that the loss of territory to any of these districts might be impaired.

HAINES ATTEMPTS TO TAKE LIFE

JAIL PRISONER BECOMES DEPONDENT AND CUTS ARTERY WITH SAFETY PIN.

Dependancy has settled upon the mind of O. S. Haines, who is serving six months in the county jail, and he made an attempt to accomplish his own destruction Wednesday afternoon by opening an artery in his wrist with a brass safety pin. Haines was very deliberate and quietly sat down and let nearly a quart of blood flow, when Sam Bray, a fellow prisoner, wandered into the corridor and seeing the condition of Haines, gave the alarm.

Sheriff Beattie called Dr. Norris, who was in the courthouse at the time, and the wound of Haines was dressed much against the will of the man, who declared he did not want to live. Bray seized Haines, and twisted a tourniquet around his wrist and then held the prisoner until medical aid came.

It is believed that Haines is insane, and he will be given an examination. He has for some time past brooded over his imprisonment, and has been in jail for some months, being sentenced to serve six months from April 27 last, after entering a plea of guilty to a statutory crime. He is 26 years of age, and has a wife and several children residing at Park-

UNION EVANGELICAL CHURCHES IN SESSION

SIXTY TENTS ARE PITCHED AT JENNINGS LODGE TO ACCOMMODATE DELEGATES.

The union conventions of the two conferences of the Evangelical church—Evangelical Association and the United Evangelical—opened Tuesday night at Arbor Lodge in the big pavilion tent with a union service. Addresses were delivered by Dr. C. C. Poling and Rev. M. J. Ballentyne, of the United Evangelical Church, and Rev. Theodore Schauer, Rev. H. E. Horschuch and others of the Evangelical Association. All the talks were in favor of union.

Wednesday the convention of the Sunday School League was held. Papers and addresses on subjects of interest to Sunday school workers were given. Wednesday night the convention was held in the tent. The grounds are well illuminated at night by gasoline lights placed among the trees. At the entrance to the ground is a large welcome arch, which is also lighted at night. Near the arch is a banner with the words, "The Keystone League of Christian Endeavor" and "Young People's Alliance." Representatives of the two branches are present from all over Oregon and from Washington. On the ground are over 60 tents, all of which are occupied. Attendance is already three times as large as it has ever been before. Grace Church, of Lents, has 14 tents in a group, one-half of the congregation being present. Milwaukie has two tents and 28 young men and women from the local church in charge of Rev. N. Shupp.

When the ministerial institutes convene next week resolutions in favor of the Dalles College will be adopted. Yesterday the convention of the Keystone League of Christian Endeavor and Young People's Alliance was opened, to continue through today.

Deviled Oatmeal.

Cut cold molded oatmeal in slices or fingers, dip in a mixture composed of equal parts of mixed mustard, melted butter and thick, sweet cream. Roll the pieces on fine dry crumbs, then in beaten eggs, again in crumbs and fry crisply brown in hot lard. Serve with broiled sausage.

One-half cup butter, one cup sugar, two eggs, one tablespoon molasses, one-half cup coffee infusion, one and three-fourths cups flour, two and one-half teaspoons baking powder, one and one-half level teaspoons cinnamon, one-fourth level teaspoon each of cloves, mace and allspice, one-half cup raisins, one-third cup currants, one-fourth cup citron cut in thin strips, one teaspoon vanilla. Cream the butter, add gradually the sugar, then the eggs, well beaten and the molasses. Sift together the flour, baking powder and spices, and add alternately with the coffee; then add the vanilla. Beat well and fold in the fruit sprinkled with flour. Bake in a deep cake pan in a moderate oven for one hour.
