JOHN GLEASON LAID TO REST

PROMINENT RESIDENT OF OREGON CITY PASSES AWAY.

John Gleason, a well-known citizen and wool buyer, of this city, died Monday morning at 8 o'clock at the family residence on Fourteenth and Center streets, after an illness of several months of tuberculosis of the stomach.

Mr. Gleason was born in Neagh, Tipperary County, Ireland, on February 26, 1846, and came to the United States in 1860. Mr. Gleason first settled at Cavendish, Vermont, afterwards going to Waltham and Boston, Mass.

In 1869 he settled in Salem, Oregon, where he was married to Miss Margaret McMonigal. He was connected with the Salem Woolen Mills until 1871, when he and his wife came to Oregon City where his wife survives him. Mr. Gleason accepted a position with the Oregon City Woolen Mills, and after remaining with this company for many years, resigned and went to Eastern Oregon and engaged in the wool buying business for many Eastern firms.

Mr. Gleason, when in his health, was a man of jovial disposition, and had a large circle of friends in this city. He leaves, besides a widow, three daughters, Mary, Helen, teacher in the Salem school; Anita, principal of the Canemah school, and four sons, Michael, John T., Thomas and Ray.

The funeral was held Wednesday morning from St. John's Catholic church, at 10 o'clock. Rev. A. Hillebrand officiating. The deceased being well known throughout the state, and one of Oregon City's most prominent citizens, the funeral was one of the largest ever held in this city, many friends of the deceased coming from Portland. The A. O. U. W., of which Mr. Gleason had been a member for many years, attended the funeral in a body. The interment took place in the family plot in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at Mountain View. The floral offerings were magnificent. The pall bearers were E. G. Caulfield, Dr. George Hoeye, William M. Downey, M. E. Clancey, John Chambers and H. J. Harding.
