### GRANDSON OF MRS. GARY.

George Harmon Passes Away at His Home in Portland.

George Harmon, son of Mr. and Mrs. I. A. Harmon, of Portland, died at the family home at an early hour on Friday morning, after a few days' illness of paralysis. ### Humane Slaughter of Animals.

The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals will shortly begin experiments with a new method for killing animals. Henry Bergh, the treasurer and former president of the society, has invented an air gun of large size, working like a pneumatic hammer. The society some time ago offered a reward of \$500 for an improved and humane method for slaughtering purposes. Mr. Bergh thinks his invention fulfills the requirements of the society for an improved device for slaughtering animals.

### SELECTING BROOD SOWS.

Few farmers are more displeasing to a practical farmer than to see a lot of heterogeneous pigs following an old scrub sow. They are very unsatisfactory to the feed lot and unprofitable to the farmer. There is no excuse for keeping scrub sows. The brood sow should be large, roomy and stand well on her toes. Her shoulders should be smooth and deep, back wide and slightly arched. Taste should be ample room for heart and lungs provided by a large and deep chest, well sprung ribs and straight, deep sides; a deep, roomy body from end to end. A good depth of chest and abdomen are especially important in a sow.

If possible, the sow should be selected from a large litter, this being apt to insure fecundity. Each sow should have at least twelve well developed teats, thus providing proper room and nourishment for large litters of pigs.—Agricultural Epitomist.
