

The fresh ranch butter is a scarce article in the Oregon City market, and is retailing from 60 to 65 cents per roll. Second grade ranch butter is retailing for 50 cents. "As to the claim that the leaders of the American Federation of Labor have given Bryan the labor vote, that is sheer nonsense. No man and no se of men can give away the labor vote The labor organizations are divided between the Republican and the Democratic parties. All sound, independen workingmen will resent the suggestion of giving away their votes. They can think for themselves.

"Bryan has a monomania for endeav oring to boss the Democratic party. He is probably a more dangerous man now than at the beginning of his presidential ambitions, for his programme is filled with appeals to all the disturbing, unstable elements."
