MRS. EFFIE B. ROBINSON SAYS MONEY MUST HAVE BEEN TAKEN FROM BODY.

#### SHE OFFERS REWARD

Currency Was Pinned to Pocket In Clothes of F. A. Williamson, Who Died In the Woods Near Oswego.

In the firm bellef that \$1300 in currency was stolen from her father's body, Mrs. Effle B. Robinson has of fered a reward of \$100 for its recovery. Mrs. Robinson lives at Lents, Or., and it was through her persistent efforis that the identity of the man whose body was found over a month ago near Springbrook schoolbouse, three miles from Oswego, was established. He was F. A. Williamson. Mrs Robinson came to Oregon City

Saturday, accompanied by her attorney J. H. Hitchings and presented pa-pers grouesting her appointment as executor of her father's estate. Be-fore her at the counter in the office of County Clerk Greenman was Attorney Hease, who has a client that believes he dead man was his brother. Mr Hesse, however, withdrew his papers although they were signed by County Judge Dimick and announced that he rould permit Mrs. Robinson to file eserving the privilege of contesting er appointment.

There is apparently no doubt that Mrs. Robinson is Williamson's daugater, and the sole heir to his property as she is his only living child. Ac ording to her story Williamson had resided at Texarkana, Tex., for the last three years and came to Portland to visit her. They came to Oregon lity together August 7. He complained of feeling ill and wanted to go out in the woods.

Williamson was once a wealthy man and had an interest in a bank at Appleton, Wis. In this institution he had \$40,000 on deposit, but lost it in the crash of 1893, when the bank failed. Before he left Portland for this city, he went to the First National Bank and had \$1300 changed into 26 \$50 currency notes. Besides this money, Williamson had \$660 in gold in a buckskin sack.
