The Washington Creamery Company is paying 35 cents per pound for butter fat, and pays the freight. The installation of this cream tester will prove a great convenience to many of the farmers in this part of the county. Mr. Erickson invites the farmers who bring their cream here to witness the manner in which the machine is operated.
