The Primitive Baptists will hold services in the Mountain View Church next Sunday at 2:30 and Sunday at 11 A. M.

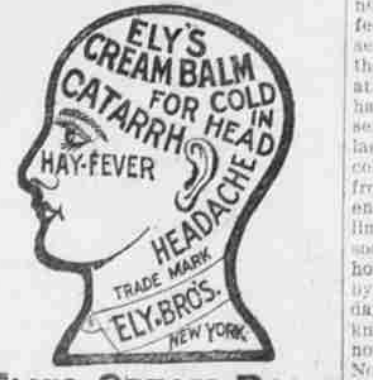
Gus Gotberg made a business trip to Molalla Sunday and returned Monday.

GUNSELL'S CONDITION SERIOUS.

Milwaukee Man Has Critical Attack of Tuberculosis. F. P. DeVanay, of Albany, was in Oregon City on Wednesday on his way home from Milwaukee, where he had been summoned by the serious illness of his grandson, Lee G. Gussell, who Gussell formerly resided at Albany, and has been taking treatment for some time at the Open Air Sanatorium for tuberculosis, Mr. Gussell's condition is serious, and his mother, Mrs. Serepta Hanson, of Albany, and sister, Mrs. C. Hale, of Jefferson, have been summoned to his bedside. Mrs. Hale passed through Oregon City Wednesday evening for Milwaukee, after being at the Sanatorium for some time. Mr. Gussell took up his residence with his family at Milwaukee where he could be near the institution. Mr. DeVanay is one of the best known residents of Albany county, having come across the plains by ox team in 1865, and has been a resident of that county since that time. Mr. DeVanay was 80 years of age on October 20, is one of the staunchest democrats of the state, and cast his vote for Taylor at the last election. He is the father of nine children, and has given each one a home. He has disposed of his 800 acres of land, and is making his home with his daughter, Mrs. Mart Bellows. He left last night for Jefferson, and from there he goes to Selo, where he is to visit with his sons.
