MILWAUKEE.

Owing to the absence of Mayor Shindler at the meeting held for the purpose of nominating a Mayor, a Recorder and a Marshall, a Treasurer and two Councilmen, Fred Lehman called the meeting to order at 8 o'clock last evening. John Kelso was elected chairman and Lee Duffy secretary. Mr. Philip Streib was nominated for Mayor by Mr. Lechner, and as there were no other candidates for this office, it was moved that Mr. Streib be nominated by acclamation. The motion was carried and Mr. Streib was nominated for Mayor. There were four nominations for Councilmen, Isaac Mullin, Dr. Hauer, Fred Lehman, and Ol Mathews. A motion was then made and seconded that the chairman appoint three tellers. The motion was carried and Mr. Kelso appointed Messrs. Hansen, Pelzer and Davis. The result of the election for Councilmen was as follows: Mullin 36, Hauer 14, Lehman 14, Mathews 3. Mullin and Lehman were declared nominated. Nominations for Recorder were then called for. Those nominated were, Chas. Lakin, Lee Duffy, Jesse Keck, Homer Mullin and A. H. Dowling. All declined the nomination with the exception of Mr. Dowling and a motion was made and carried that he be nominated by acclamation. Jesse Keck being the only nominee for City Marshal he was nominated by acclamation upon a motion duly seconded.

For Treasurer, E. T. Elmer being the only nominee a motion was made and carried that he be nominated by acclamation. Mr. Streib, the nominee for Mayor made a little speech, promising if elected to conduct the city affairs in a business-like way and to treat all parts of the city alike. Mr. Lehman, one of the nominees for councilman, also made a short talk. Mr. Mullin said that action spoke louder than words. Mr. Dowling spoke a few words. There appearing to be no other business the meeting was adjourned.

Mayor Shindler has filed his petition to come out as an independent candidate for re-election.
