

LIVE WIRE KILLS HIM

KARL A. YUNG MEETS SUDDEN AND ACCIDENTAL DEATH IN SOUTH DAKOTA.

SAD THANKSGIVING DAY

Son of Late Pastor of German Lutheran Church Left Here Short Time Ago to Study Electrical Engineering.

The body of the late Karl A. Yung reached here Monday night and the funeral was held Tuesday morning at the German Lutheran Church, the interment being in Mountain View cemetery. Many sorrowing friends of the family attended the funeral and beautiful floral offerings were in evidence.

The unfortunate young man made his home for several years in this city, where his father was pastor of the German Lutheran Church. About two months ago he went to Huron, Leadle County, South Dakota to study electrical engineering, attending the high school where his brother, Oliver Yung, is principal, and obtaining employment in the local electrical plant. He expected to complete his course in this branch of mechanics at one of the larger schools of the East, but Thanksgiving Day, while working at the plant, he accidentally took hold of a live wire and was killed instantly. He was 22 years of age and was a bright student, having attended the Barclay school of this city. He is survived by two brothers, Rev. Yung, of Seattle, and Oliver Yung of South Dakota, and a sister, Mrs. Buchhold, of this city.
