GLADSTONE A DISTRICT
 SEPARATED FROM PARKPLACE AND ED. HARRINGTON APPOINTED SUPERVISOR.

CLACKAMAS RIVER LINE
 Forty-five Men Are Named to Take Charge of County Roads and Two Are Yet to Be Chosen.

The County Court has added a new road district through the division of Parkplace and Gladstone. The dividing line is the Clackamas River, following the same division as was made when the Parkplace school district divided last year and the district of Gladstone created. The new Gladstone district is No. 47, and Ed Harrington has been appointed supervisor. The work in the Parkplace district which retains the number 11, will be placed in the hands of Charles Livesey, who will have the supervision of the Clackamas River road, which is, in itself, no small task. The County Court has appointed all of the supervisors for 1909, with the exception of Districts Nos. 9 and 28, as follows:

TENDERS HIS RESIGNATION
 DR. CARLL SIGNIFIES INTENTION TO WITHDRAW FROM SCHOOL BOARD.
DIRECTORS DO NOT ACT
 Colleagues of the Chairman Will Wait For Written Tender Before Naming His Successor.

Dr. W. E. Carll, chairman of the board of directors of the public schools, tendered his verbal resignation Monday night at a meeting of the board. No action was taken by the three members, Geo. A. Harding, W. A. Huntley and Dr. A. L. Beattie, who were present, pending the receipt of a written resignation. Director Hedgcock is in Salem attending the legislative session.
 The board of directors Monday night received a report from City Superintendent McKee, who stated that the schools had been closed at 1 o'clock last Wednesday afternoon by order of the chairman of the board and that the water had afterwards been shut off by Superintendent Howell, of the water commission, resulting in the pipes becoming frozen and making it impossible to resume school. Plumbers worked at the Barclay building Sunday and Monday in an attempt to thaw the frozen pipes, but made little progress. The board hereupon declared a holiday of one week.
 The written resignation of Dr. W. E. Carll as a member of the board of directors of the city schools, was filed Tuesday and a meeting will probably be called some time this week to take action and elect Dr. Carll's successor, who will hold office until the next regular election in June, 1909.
