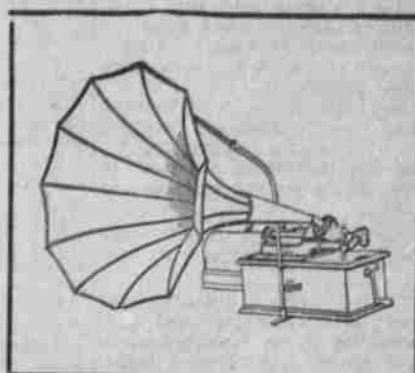

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COURT IS IN SESSION

SEVERAL IMPORTANT CASES TO BE TRIED THIS WEEK AND NEXT.

Cases of considerable importance that have been hanging fire for months have been placed on the calendar for trial at this adjourned term of the Circuit Court, which opened in Oregon City Monday. The docket at the regular November term was a record breaker and there were several cases that took practically all the time at the disposal of Judge McBride. The suit of Adkins Bros. Greenwood Lumber Company was set for trial on Monday, but will probably be settled out of court. The following cases have been placed on the calendar:

January 22, Latourette vs. Apperson, W. W. Cotton and C. D. & D. C. Latourette for Plaintiff; W. D. Fenton and Franklin T. Griffith for defendant.

January 23, Trullinger vs. Jaggard, C. D. & D. C. Latourette for plaintiff; Geo. C. Brownell and J. E. Hedges for defendant.

January 26, School District No. 48 vs. School District No. 115.

January 27, Yager vs. Yager.

January 28, Oregon City Manufacturing Company vs. Hawley Pulp & Paper Company.

The suit of Latourette vs. Apperson is one of considerable importance involving a large sum of money. Captain Apperson appeared as surety for money advanced to Henry Meldrum and H. H. Johnson. The appearance of two such well known attorneys as W. W. Cotton and W. D. Fenton in the case lends it additional interest. Another case that is attracting attention is that of Mrs. Erika Trullinger against Frank Jaggard for \$5000 damages.

FARM HAND BEATS WOMAN.

Otto Miller Assaults Mrs. David Scheff and Escapes.

Otto Miller was wanted by the police. He is charged with beating Mrs. David Scheff, of Redland, and after receiving information relative to the assault Sheriff Beattie started for Redland. Before reaching there, however, he found that the man had fled and it is believed he reached Oregon City and caught a car into Portland. Miller has been working at the Scheff place for the last six weeks. He is a German, aged 35 years, and wore a brown checked coat, blue shirt, and brown overalls. He is given to laughing. He is about 5 feet 6 inches in height and had about two weeks' growth of beard when he disappeared.

After breaking the drills and working until an early hour they left their tools where they quit and took possession of an Oregon Electric hand car at the station near by, where they left a valve containing 10 pounds of dynamite and a bottle of glycerine. They traveled north on the car to Molloy, where they abandoned the car and took to the woods, and all trace of them was lost. They took the gun from the bank.
