FACTORY BILL PASSED

CAMPBELL AND DIMICK MAKE ELOQUENT APPEALS FOR PASSAGE OF BILL.

ELEVEN VOTE AGAINST

Representative Jones, of Clackamas, Presents Bill for Free Text Books Again This Session.

of the Clackamas County delegation ed from a rear window, and from inin the House Monday afternoon succeeded in having passed their bill providing for an eight-hour workday in all manufacturing, mechanical, mercantile, other establishments operating continuously throughout the 24 hours. Labor was eulogized by several of the speakers supporting the bill, while those speaking against the bill argued that its provisions, if enforced, would work an abridgment of the right of contract.

Vote is 46 to 11.

Those voting aginst the bill which was passed by a vote of 45 to 11, were: Bedillion, Bones, Brattain, Buchannan, Corrigan, Eaton, Farrell, Meek, Muncy, Philpott and Reynolds.

Campbell and Dimick, of the Clackamas delegation, made efoquent appeals for the passage of the bill which they declared, meant much for better and higher type of citizenship. They referred to the conditions that exist in the paper mills at Oregon City, where the men are obliged to work shifts of 10 hours one week and 13 or 14 the next. Hughes, Jones (Lincoln and Polk) and McKinney also indersed the bill.

Buchanan Objects to Bill.

Buchanan said he objected to the bill for the reason that it impaired the right of contract. He contended that if a man desired to work for more than ten hours a day he should be granted the privilege without subject tng his employer to arrest and a fine for violation of a law as was proposed. Reynolds refused to support the bill for the reason that it would serious ly interfere with the operation of fruitdrying plants in the Fall of the vewhen by reason of the short season. it is necessary to operate evaporators continuously in order to properly care for the fruit. When he did not come home to supper, a search was made, and his mangled remains were found. It is said he had five blasts to set off, and when the last missed fire he went to investigate.
