Grange in regular session assembled. That we are unalterably opposed to a constitutional convention, and we do hereby call upon the Pomona, Councils, Subordinate Granges, Federated Trades Union, and all citizens of Oregon who believe in self-government by the people, to aid in rejecting the proposed constitutional convention at the November election, 1910, and thus retain for the people of Oregon their unimpaired power to initiate and enact legislation and to discharge public officers by their vote at the polls.

SECTION F. Class—New Roses. No. 1—Best 1 New Rose, named. (Four prizes given in this class.)

SECTION G. Class—Large Roses. No. 1—Best 1 Large Rose—1 variety, named.

SECTION H. Class—Wild Flowers. No. 1—Best General Collection, separate varieties, named. (Three prizes in this collection.)

Rules.

I. All roses entered for prizes must be grown out of doors, and owned by person making entry.

II. All roses entered for prizes must be grown and cultivated by amateurs.

III. All exhibitors not members of the Rose Society will be charged twenty-five cents.

IV. The same variety of rose or roses cannot be entered for more than one prize, except for the "best general collection." Any added foliage shall disqualify.

V. Any exhibit for prizes bearing name of exhibitor shall disqualify.

VI. To prepare exhibits for competition the next white card three inches long by one inch wide. On one side write name of rose and on the other write the section, class and number in which you wish to exhibit.

VII. Exhibits as received, will be numbered by the committee, according to the respective sections, class and number for which they are entered.

VIII. Prizes must be awarded by numbers. Name of exhibitor will be given afterwards.

IX. All entries must be made by eleven o'clock, A. M., on first day of exhibit.

X. Exhibits for display, not for competition, may be entered bearing name of exhibitor.

XIV. Roses improperly named or entered which do not conform to the rules and regulations of the Clackamas County Rose Society Exhibit, will be ruled out of contest.

XV. No person will be allowed in the hall during the time that the judges are awarding the prizes.

XVI. Rules will be enforced, and there can be no appeal from the Judge's decision, unless an error is made in judging.

XVII. Admission ten (10) cents, except to members of the Rose Society.

XVIII. All members wishing to avail themselves of the privileges of the Rose Society, must pay dues before the first Saturday in June. Books for membership will be closed after above date.

NEWS FROM THE BRANSONS.

Captain and Wife Doing Evangelistic Work in Nebraska.

LEXINGTON, Neb., May 12—(Editorial.) We are still in joyful work in this state and after the winter are in good health. Spring is very backward, accompanied with wind storms. Trees are beginning to leaf. Corn fields are not all plowed. Up to my last writing in January we had an ideal winter and were flattering ourselves that spring was near, without any blizzards. January 27 was a warm, sunny day in which all were basking, when suddenly a storm, that reminded the natives of the memorable January, in 1888, which swept down from the north, proving that old Boreas hadn't forgotten his old pranks. With it came a remarkable fall of temperature and the air was filled with snow and snow that almost blinded one as he made travel almost an impossibility. As the wind increased in velocity the snow became thicker and thicker, until it was being driven before a 60-mile gale. The air was full of snow and dust through which no one could see. The dust sifted into every crevice and housewives took to using the buckets full. Hard snow continued to fall all night it would have drifted to untold depths. The wind continued to blow all next day and much damage was done. Plate glass in Omaha alone amounted to \$25,000. By another twelve hours the wind ceased and in a few days we had spring-like weather again. On Sunday, February 7, with the temperature 60 degrees and people wearing summer apparel, suddenly the wind shifted to the north and in a short time we had 15 degrees below zero. Many people awoke to find their pumps and water pipes solid. The cold was accompanied by several inches of snow, which drifted badly and railway traffic was suspended several days. In Montana, Wyoming and the Dakotas the temperature was 40 degrees below zero or more. Again February 14, another blizzard came and prevailed several days, temperature as low as 23 degrees below zero. Since that cold spell there have been occasional frosts and freezes, enough to keep the fruit blossoms back, which has been a blessing as there has been but little fruit for three years.
