MILWAUKEE.

At a special meeting of the Milwaukee Volunteer Fire Department Monday night, the members voted to disband on account of the non-support of the city officials.

J. J. Straight, electrician at the car shops here has been transferred to the shops at the O. W. P. dock in Portland for a few days. He is repairing the cars and getting them ready for the summer run.

The Rose City Shingle Co.'s mill has been shut down for the last few days waiting the arrival of a raft of logs.

Work on the new bank building has been delayed on account of not being able to get gravel for the completion of the basement. Messrs. Toats and Moran, the contractors, expect to finish the basement this week.

Alex Flatland, who has been in New Jersey for two years arrived here Tuesday. Mr. Flatland was shop foreman for the O. W. P. for some time before leaving for New Jersey. He expects to remain for some time.
