**EQUAL SUFFRAGISTS TO MEET AT SEATTLE**  
 WASHINGTON ASSOCIATION WILL OPEN ANNUAL CONVENTION NEXT WEDNESDAY.

The Washington Equal Suffrage Association will hold its Twentieth Annual Convention in the lecture room of the Plymouth Church, in Seattle, beginning at two o'clock, June 30th. This convention will be of unusual importance, according to an announcement just made by Mrs. Emma Smith Devoe, president; not only because of the distinction of entertaining the Forty-first Annual Convention of the National Woman Suffrage Association during its deliberations from July 1st to 7th, inclusive. Special parties are coming here from New York and Chicago and will be met by an escort at Spokane to accompany the Easterners to Puget Sound. The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition has set aside Wednesday, July 7th, as Woman-Suffrage Day, at which time the national officers will have full charge of the programme in the Auditorium. It is expected that every club in the state will be represented by entertaining delegates, and that as many others as can come to Seattle will attend this notable gathering. Mrs. Eva Emery Dye, of this city, will be one of the speakers at the convention.

**FRANCIS REVENUE IS DEAD AT SANDY**

CENTRAL FIGURE OF EASTERN CLACKAMAS COUNTY WAS AGED 95 YEARS.  
 Francis Revenue, probably the oldest man in Clackamas County, died at 11 o'clock Monday night at Sandy, at the home of his son, Edward A. Revenue. His age was 95 years. The funeral was held at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning at Sandy.  
 Mr. Revenue was of French descent and a part of his early life was spent on the sea. He emigrated from Louisiana to Oregon in 1852, coming over the mountains and settling near Sandy, where he took up a donation land claim, which is now practically intact. His wife died more than 10 years ago. Mr. Revenue had lived at the home of his son, Edward A., for the last 16 years.  
 Deceased was long the central figure of the Sandy country. He had many friends and acquaintances in Oregon City and Portland. The following children survive him: John H., Sarah J.
