HONORING HIS MEMORY.

Commendatory in the extreme is the action of Circuit Judge Eakin in declining to sanction the movement to prevent the historic home of Dr. McLoughlin from being placed upon the public square. This decision was rendered on purely legal grounds, and the personal point did not and was not permitted to enter into the case, so far as his Honor was concerned, nevertheless The Enterprise is happy to be given this opportunity in an editorial sense.

Dr. McLoughlin's work in this great Northwest country can not be over estimated. History, and reliable history too, tells us that time and again he reached down in his capacious pocket to help the needy, assist the suffering and succor those who had encountered all sorts of privations in order to make their homes in Oregon. What would this State have been without this pioneer spirit? Who are we, who came after, and who find living comparatively easy, as compared with the days of the 50's, that we should find fault, and malign the building where the good Doctor entertained hundreds at his own expense, simply because it is said to be "old, dilapidated and unsanitary." The building is old and dilapidated. It is probably no more unsanitary than other places in Oregon City. Even then, does it have to remain so? Does any one imagine that the McLoughlin Memorial Association intends to leave the building in its present condition? Has it not been publicly stated time after time that the structure will be thoroughly renovated and made presentable and inhabitable? Those who have ears to hear, let them hear.

PROPOSES CORPORATION TAX.

The most interesting and important phase of the twelfth week's consideration of the tariff bill has been the presentation of a proposition, favored by President Taft, to impose a tax of two per cent on the net earnings of corporations, and the decision of the Senate leaders to bring in an amendment embodying the President's idea, to be offered as a substitute for the income tax proposition. Only second in importance to this has been the agreement reached by Senators Bailey and Cummins on the income tax proposition, as a result of which there is now before the Senate only a single income tax amendment which in brief imposes a tax of two per cent on all incomes over \$5,000 a year, including those of corporations, and carrying a provision of reimbursement to stockholders of corporations, based upon the law, whose total incomes from all sources are less than \$5,000, of the amount which, as stockholders, they contributed to the tax paid by the corporation.

Portland will be the rallying point for Baptists of the Northern half of the continent during the last week of the month. The Northern Baptists Association will open its annual convention here on June 25 and the gathering will continue for one week. An interesting programme has been prepared and there will be numerous receptions, excursions and other functions during convention week.

School Meetings Are Held.

The annual school meeting was held in the city hall on Monday evening, and the matter of installing a high school here was taken up. There were three schools represented, Canby, Riverside and Mundorf. A vote was taken and the following was the result: Canby, 22 votes, 21 for high school, 1 against; Riverside, 15 votes, all for high school; Mundorf, 17 votes, 6 for high school, and 11 against. It is probable that the high school department will be installed in Canby at the coming term of school, as there are many pupils, who are anxious to take up the work. Dr. H. A. Dedman was re-elected school director, and William Knight clerk. These two men have taken an effective interest in the school at this place, and their re-election is a satisfaction to all. A five mill tax was voted on and passed, three mills for the school, and 2 mills for furnace and other improvements.

The election of teachers of the fall term have not yet been elected, but will probably be within a few days. Several applications have been filed for the rooms.

The Riverside school house held the Riverside school meeting on Monday evening. J. H. Colby was elected director, and A. M. Vinyard, clerk.

The following is the new time schedule of the north bound Southern Pacific train, that went into effect this week: 8:17 A. M. and 4:21 P. M. The morning train formerly left after 10 o'clock, and the afternoon train at 4:07. Several who wished to go to Portland on Tuesday morning, who were not aware of the change of time, were obliged to remain over until the afternoon train. The south bound trains remain the same.

J. J. Sandness, who left some time ago for Minnesota, where he has property interests, writes that the crops of that state are looking excellent, and if nothing happens, there will be large crops this year. Mr. Sandness is at present visiting his sister, who is very ill at Rushford, Minn., and will not arrive home until some time next month.

Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Rogers, and daughter, Miss Jessie, of Hood River, spent Tuesday in Canby. Mr. Rogers is at present owner of three fruit ranches in Hood River, where some of the finest Hood River apples are raised. His home place consists of 220 acres, mostly under cultivation.

The prices received for his apples this year averaged \$2 per box. Mr. Rogers is a member of the firm of Jorgensen Investment Company, the name being taken from those interested, who are Messrs. Jordan, Garbade and Rogers. This company about a year ago purchased the Buckman tract at Canby. There are 125 acres, and the purchasing price was \$16,000. The timber on the place has brought this company \$17,500. Mr. Rogers, whose property is Mount Hood, has one of the finest pieces of land in that section. Mrs. Rogers and daughter were so impressed with the Canby country on Tuesday, that Mr. Rogers has decided to erect a beautiful residence here and make this their future home, which will probably be in the early fall.

There will be two red hot base ball games played on the diamond at this place Sunday, June 27, between Molalla and Canby Reds and Macksburg and Canby Blues. The Molalla-Canby game will be called at 1:45 P. M. Soon after the first game the Canby Blues will show what they can do in the base ball line. The Molalla and Macksburg teams are claimed to be excellent teams, but the Canby boys are to play their best, and the outside teams will have to go some to get ahead of the teams of this place.

An admission of 25 cents is to be charged. This to include both games. Captain W. C. Butts, of California, the noted temperance lecturer and organizer will speak at the Christian Church in this city on Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock. Effects of Moderate Drinking.
No human being can be absolutely certain that he will long be able to remain a moderate drinker. After thirty years' study and experience Dr. Norman Kerr declares that no man can remain a moderate drinker, as alcohol has the power to create a progressive appetite for itself, so that when liquor is taken, even in the most moderate quantities, an increased amount is soon necessary to produce the same effect. Every drunkard begins as a moderate drinker.

Medically the man who gets drunk once a month for several days, and is a strict teetotaler at intervals, will, other things being equal, undermine his health less than the man who practices such "moderation" as a glass of spirits, three glasses of wine, or four pills of beer or stout, every day. Even plants will become stunted and changed if they are kept moistened with a little alcohol. Given in small quantities with food, alcohol will dwarf the growth of young animals. The use of alcoholic liquors, even in very limited quantities, in early childhood is likely to hinder the growth of the bone cells, making the stature stunted and causing both bodily and mental weakness to become enfeebled.

Moderate drinkers have not the endurance of abstainers, and they show fatigue in much less time and with less work done. A person who could raise with the forearm a hundred pounds, utterly failed to lift half this weight one hour after an ounce of alcohol had been used. Experiments show that when even a small dose of alcohol is allowed, typewriters do a smaller amount of work and make a larger number of mistakes than when alcohol is not used.

A study of the subject shows the death rate to be higher among moderate drinkers than among those who once or twice a year "go on a spree" and then "sober up." The continuous use of alcohol has a cumulative action and increases the poisons found in the body while diminishing the power of eliminating them. The direct result of this is that moderate drinkers are easily carried off by pneumonia, epidemic and the results of not necessarily fatal accidents. A prolonged study of so-called moderate drinkers, made by members of the American Medical Society for the Study of Alcohol, shows that such persons rarely live beyond fifty years, and that their descendants seldom live beyond thirty years. Statistical studies extending over many thousand cases prove that the person who is an habitual moderate user of spirits at twenty-five years of age rarely reaches his fiftieth year. As chairman of a committee to study the newspaper examples and advertisements of persons who had lived to an extreme old age through the use of alcohol, the late Dr. T. D. Crothers found in twenty instances that that was true. Such misleading advertisements are kept alive and running by large distilling and whiskey firms in order to advance their business.

Our motto is: Hatch no more chicks than you have ground and house for. Feed these well, keep them free from lice and filth, so far as possible, and then colonize them.
By this plan we seldom lose a bird except by accident.
Build small houses that are easily put together and taken apart or have them on wheels or runners, so they may be easily moved, and put your chicks that

COLONY HOUSE.

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Build small houses that are easily put together and taken apart or have them on wheels or runners, so they may be easily moved, and put your chicks that

have been properly weaned from hens and brooder heat into them, fifteen or twenty-five in each house. These houses should be so far apart that broods will not mix and should be moved often, so ground is kept new.

The particular advantages of this system are: Birds are fed more evenly than in large flocks, have more room night and day for growth, have purer air, more green food and space for exercise and less filth and lice and liability to disease, while a contagion is quickly stamped out. Chicks grow quickly to maturity, sexes may be separated, brooders are healthier, hens lay better, eggs are more fertile, stock is never on tainted ground and ground is evenly fertilized.

The colony plan is in vogue on many farms for young and old stock the year around. A tolling stone may gather no green moss, but a rolling colony house, with good stock, gathers lots of long greenbacks.

Maintaining the Highways.
The New York State Automobile association has introduced a bill before the legislature at Albany which provides for a tax on automobiles graduated as to weight, the proceeds to be devoted to the maintenance of the improved highways of the state. On the basis of present registration an annual income of \$500,000 is expected from this source. The income from automobile registration fees in Massachusetts for eighteen months amounted to \$145,000, which was used in road maintenance last year. But the state has built 770 miles of improved road, which require for proper maintenance an expenditure of \$300 a mile a year. It is estimated that a law patterned after that recommended by the New York Automobile association would provide a sufficient income in Massachusetts to maintain the improved roads without a specific legislative appropriation.
