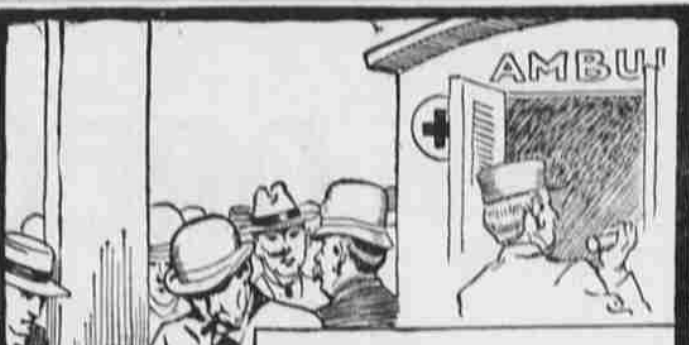
CHILDREN CRY FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA BEAVER CREEK.
