FUNERAL OF ALAN COOKE.

Body of Unfortunate Boy Laid to Rest in Mountain View.

The funeral services over the remains of Alan Cooke, who was killed by a train near The Dalles on Wednesday morning and who was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Cooke, were held Friday morning at 10 o'clock from the family residence, 501 Washington street. The Christian Science services at the house were conducted by Mrs. C. B. Huyek, and at the grave Rev. S. P. Davis pronounced the benediction. The funeral was largely attended, and the burial services were beautiful. Among the pieces that were noticeable were those sent by the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, of which the deceased was a member; employees of the O. W. P.; City officials and First National Bank. The remains were interred in Mountain View Cemetery. The pall bearers were William Adams, L. B. Kesser and John Callesotte, members of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen; William Wilson, William Howell and Carl Nehren, of this city. The Brotherhood of Trainmen and O. W. P. were largely represented. Mr. Cooke worked in several different departments of the O. W. P. for four years. He has worked for the recently promoted to the position he held when he met his death. At the time of his death he was 22 years of age. The deceased leaves a wife and baby two years of age, who will for the present make their home with Mrs. Cooke's parents, at Sheridan.

It takes considerable prospecting here in Oregon to get an enterprise started like an electric plant.

There is one enterprise here in old Clackamas County that is followed by some people to follow and be sure of getting a living. We will leave our readers to guess what vocation that is.

Wait till we get our oil wells bored and the oil refinery and other such things here and then we will want a newspaper here.
