Body of Unfortunate Boy Laid to Rest in Mountain View.

The funeral services over the remains of Alan Cooke, who was killed by a train near The Dailes on Wed nesday morning, and who was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Cooke, were held Friday morning at 10 o'clock from the family residence 501 Washington street, The Chris-tian Science services at the house were conducted by Mrs. C. B. Huyck and at the grave Rev. S. P. Davis pronounced the benediction. The funeral was largely attended, and the floral pieces were beautiful. Among the pieces that were noticeable were those sent by the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, of which the de ceased was a member; employes of the O. W. P.; City officials and First National Bank. The remains were interred in Mountain View Cemetery. The pall bearers were William Adams L. D. Kezer and Joseph Callicotte members of the Brotherhood of Rail way Trainmen; William Wilson, Wil-The Brotherhood of Trainmen and O. W. P. were largely represented. Mr. Cooke worked in several different departments of the O. W. P. for four years. He has worked for the R. & N. for some time, and was ecently promoted to the position he held when he met his death. At the time of his death he was 22 years of age. The deceased leaves a wife and haby two years of age, who will for the present make their home with Mrs. Cooke's parents, at Sheridan.
