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WHEN MR. TAFT COMES.

President Taft will be made the center of a big demonstration when he comes to Portland, October 2. There will be no private entertainment for the big President, but he will be on view by the public throughout his visit. There will be a big parade in the President's honor, in which he will ride, and where he may be seen by the thousands who will want to have a look at the nation's executive. President Taft will be asked to make an address at the Armory in the afternoon and attend a banquet at the Commercial Club at night on October 2nd. Plans for Sunday, which will be spent here, are not yet made, but the president will probably attend church and spend the remainder of the day resting. Mayor Simon has named a prominent committee of Portland people to arrange the President's entertainment.

LOTTERY WAS SOME BENEFIT.

Nineteen hundred and ten is to be the banner year for new settlers in the Northwest, according to railway men. Of the third of a million applicants in Uncle Sam's land lottery, it is believed that one half will come next year to locate. This means the unsuccessful ones, who saw the land to be had here and were impressed by the opportunities. The big travel to the A. Y. P. Exposition is expected in September, when the farmers in the middle west have handed their crops. Those who have been here and gone back home, are boosting harder than ever. In fact the outlook for 1910 is so promising that operating departments of all North-Western lines are planning to put on equipment.

The arrangement of the interior of the structure will be such that the best lighting facilities can be had during the day time and the evening hours.
