The Fowler Carnival Company, of Portland, has arranged with the fair committee to have amusements on the grounds that will tend to be a great drawing card.

A baby show will be one of the features for Saturday, October 2, at 1 P. M., the babies to be not over one year of age.

SECURES VALUABLE PROPERTY IN OREGON CITY FOR TERMINAL GROUNDS.

MARRIAGE OF LESS THAN TWO MONTHS TERMINATES UNHAPPILY FOR HER.

A suit for divorce has been filed by Mrs. Augusta Ernst against Sigmund Ernst, to whom she was married July 21, 1908, at her home on Clackamas Heights.

Mr. Ernst states that her husband heaped personal indignities upon her. On August 13 Ernst took his wife's gold watch, chain, pin and diamond ring from a dresser in her bedroom, and carried these articles away with him with the intention of disposing of them after being accused of theft.

On August 17, he left home without notice for parts unknown and has not written and failed to support his wife since that time.

Since the marriage of the couple, the wife has learned that her husband was worthless, and would not work, but borrowed from his friends whenever he could.
