Lord Lovelace Will Race at Fair.

Mr. and Mrs. S. Lindsey, who have been at Seattle with some of the finest race horses in the state have returned to Canby, where they will remain during the winter. Mr. Lindsey has several head of horses he will winter at the Clackamas County fair grounds. Among the horses he has with him is Lord Lovelace, who is owned by E. H. Tonger, of Hillsboro. John Lewis, Oregon's greatest horse racer, will go on exhibition Friday afternoon and will try to break the Northwest mile record, the record being 2:11 1/2. The horse made this record recently at Centralia, Wash., before going to the State Fair. The horse is a yearling and is the only one that was raised in Oregon that has won the record better than 2:12 here. Lord Lovelace won the \$5,000 prize at the state fair two weeks ago, and also was in the big race at Portland last week. The horse was the only one among the big bunch of horses at the fair that was wintered in Oregon, the others having either been wintered in California or in the East. The bunch of horses this year at the state fair was the largest that ever met in the West. In 1906 Lord Lovelace won the \$2500 purse at the state fair and was driven at that time by Lindsey. Lord Lovelace is the only pacer that won the greater Salem two times. The horse has been in charge of Mr. Lindsey for the past three years and is considered to be the biggest money winner on the coast.

Satin Royal, an eight year old trotter is also an Oregon bred horse, and is owned by S. Vaughan, of Molalla, but who recently moved to Canby, where he will have his horses wintered on the race track of the Clackamas County Fair Association. The horse was wintered here last year and driven by Mr. Lindsey. Satin Royal won the \$2500 purse at the state fair in 1909. This is the only Oregon bred trotter to ever win a purse. When the horse was shown at the age of three years he won every premium in his showing. Satin Royal will be on exhibition at the County Fair grounds.

S. Lindsey, who was born and raised in Oregon, is proud of the horses he has trained. He is the only driver that has won more than one of the big stakes and he has won three. He is considered to be one of the best horse men in the state.

The contest will make a wheat show that will be held in connection with the annual convention of the Oregon Threshers' Association December 2 and 3 at The Dalles. There is no entry fee and all entries should be sent forward in standard two-bushel sacks, with the grower's name attached and stating where the grain was grown.

The Commercial Club will offer prizes for the best exhibits of apples at the meeting of the State Horticultural Society in Portland, December 7 and 8. The apples must be grown in Clackamas County and it is necessary to make an exhibition of only one box in order to enter the competition. The first prize is \$12.50 and the second prize \$7.50. Details of the competition will be announced later.

Mt. Pleasant Store Burned.

Company at Mount Pleasant was totally destroyed by fire late last Monday night. The building was owned by F. E. Andrews, of Portland, and is fully insured. The origin of the fire is unknown. The blaze started near the wall, between the warehouse and the store building. The store building was valued at \$5000. The building will probably be replaced.

Miss Delashmunt is 14 years of age and on Monday at the Hampton place picked 51 boxes of prunes, making \$5.00 for her day's work. She commenced picking at 8 o'clock and by 5 o'clock her 51 boxes were picked.

Miss Delashmunt was considered to be one of the fastest hop pickers at the White hop yard near Monitor this year. On one occasion she averaged 345 pounds in one day and many days picked 310 pounds.

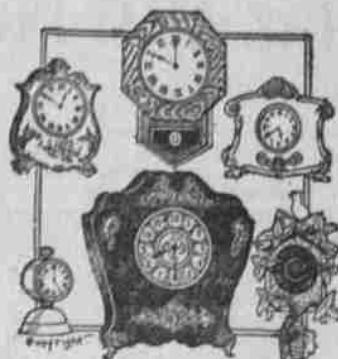
