## CLACKAMAS DEBT IS REDUCED BY \$7,000

SEMI-ANNUAL REPORT OF COUN-TY OFFICERS SHOW GOOD CONDITION.

The semi-annual raports of County Clerk Greenman, Treasurer Paddock and Sheriff Beatle, made public Wednesday, disclosed the financial condi-tion of Clackamas County and show a not indebtedoom of \$85,966.To. This is less than when the last report was made in April when the indebtedness was \$92,992. The road warrants now outstanding and unpaid amount to \$147,636.82 and the general Dind war rants outstanding total only \$1,287.75. There is, however, in the hands of the county treasurer, more than \$65, 000 which is applicable to the pay ment of county and road warrants.
