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General Market Conditions.

General inactivity in the hop business has continued for the past week Oregon stuff for some unexplained reason is not in as good demand as general market conditions would usually warrant.

California and the Eastern crops have been pretty well taken over by dealers at prices considerable in advance of those offered here.

The latter part of last week several fairly extensive sales were reported at prices slightly below former figures.

Continued heavy rains have practically put a stop to the potato digging and will greatly hamper and retard the marketing of the new crop unless nice weather succeeds this last storm.

No difference is noticed this week in the market conditions and buyers are not generally very anxious to take over much stock unless it is fancy.

Arizona and Texas still offer the only market for Northern stuff at present. Aurora prices are as follows:
