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NOTES OF THE CITY SCHOOLS

Parents are urged to report cases of illness of pupils, who are obliged to remain away from school eight half days, to the office of the superintendent of schools. It frequently happens that teachers inquire diligently concerning pupils' absence and are unable to obtain any reliable information. The case is reported and the parent is notified to investigate. This procedure is demanded by law and its purpose is to aid in the efforts to educate every child within the commonwealth. However co-operation of parents with the superintendent and teachers by reporting cases of absence before the case is considered truant would generally save the expense and what is oftentimes considered humiliation of the truant investigation. It is the plain duty of parents to cooperate with the schools to the extent of reporting absences before the truant department must make investigation; but if they will not aid in this matter they should not abuse those who are under obligation to do their full duty. Several transfers of pupils from the fourth grade Eastham school to the Eastham school made necessary this week owing to the over-crowding condition in the former grade. For the same reason several more pupils were transferred from the second grade at the Barclay to the same grade at the Eastham.
