DIVORCE IS WANTED. Mr. Vonderahe Would not Speak to Wife and Was Shy on Support.

Suit for divorce was instituted here Thursday by Mrs. Minnie Vonderahe against Charles W. Vonderahe, to whom she was married December 27, 1897, in Oregon City. She states that her husband refused to talk to her and in no way a companion. Mrs. Vonderahe charges her better half with refusing to support his family during the last five years, and she has been compelled to buy her own clothes and those of her children. In the summer of 1909 she was obliged, on account of ill health, to go to the seashore for three months and during that time he never wrote to her and when she returned home he refused to speak to her. All of this and more Mrs. Vonderahe charges in her complaint, through her attorney, George C. Brownell. The Vonderahas have three children, Carl, aged 11 years; Frank H., aged 8 years, and Louise A., aged 6 years.

BOB ADAMS OBTAINS DIVORCE. Says His Wife Danced Late and Neglected the Household.

Circuit Judge Campbell Monday granted a decree of divorce to Robert Adams, who is in the employ of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. The defendant in the action for separation was Alice A. Adams, and they were married at Oregon City, December 19, 1900. Adams charges his wife with attending dances and staying out at nights to the neglect of her household duties. Last Christmas night she went to a dance at Portland, and returned so late that Adams remonstrated with her, whereupon she hit him with a mop stick. He was awarded the care and custody of their son, Claud Dimick & Dimick appear as attorneys for Adams.

ONLY TWO WEEKS MARRIED. Mrs. Oral B. Thun Soon Became Tired of Otto.

Becoming tired of her husband's company in the brief time of two weeks, Otto A. Thun, of Milwaukee, Oregon, is suing Oral B. Thun for divorce.

The couple was married at Portland, August 19, and the husband alleges that after two short weeks of married life, his wife became tired of him, and commenced to stay out at night, and that she averaged only every other night at home. He avers that she was cruel to him also and that she heaped personal indignities upon him.

On June 13, of this year, Thun alleges, his wife in company with two other women and three young men of Portland went to Estacada and there became intoxicated and the men were all arrested and fined all the way from \$44.50 to \$119.50.

MURALT WOULD HAVE DEED. Brings Suit For Possession of Land in Andrew Hood Claim.

In order to compel Gottfried Blum to execute a warranty deed to 40 acres of land in the Andrew Hood claim, Christian Muralt has filed a suit in the Circuit Court, claiming \$400 as damages. The complaint states that on February 27, 1909, Muralt and Blum made an agreement by which the former was to purchase 40 acres in the Hood claim for \$70 per acre, and in pursuance of this agreement \$625 cash was paid on account and the balance was to be paid over before October 1, 1910, with 7 per cent interest. On August 31 Muralt paid \$300 with interest and on November 8 he tendered to Blum \$1,900.90, but he has failed to receive his deed. Attorney Walter Dimick offered this amount in court Wednesday morning. Muralt charges that Blum's title to the land is insecure, and that \$200.45 of cash belonging to Gottfried and Christine Blum, by a mortgage for \$6000.
