MURALT WOULD HAVE DEED.

Brings Suit For Possession of Land In Andrew Hood Claim.

In order to compel Gottfred Bluhm to eexcute a warranty deed to 40 acres of land in the Andrew Hood claim, Christian Muralt has filed a suit in the Circuit Court, claiming \$400 as damages. The states that on February 27, 1909, Murper acre, and in pursuance of thisabreement \$625 cash was paid on ac count and the balance was over before October 1, 1910, with 7 per cent interest. On August 31 Muralt paid \$300 with interest and on No vember 15 he tendered to Bluhm \$1, 900.90, but he has failed to receive his deed. Muralt charges that Bluhm's title to the land is incum-bered, with 200.46 acres belonging to Gottfred and Christine Bluhm, by a mortgage for \$6000.
