MRS. M. L. RUGG DEAD.
Wife of Former Baptist Pastor Victim of Paralysis.

Arthur Rugg, of this city has been advised of the death of his mother, Mrs. M. L. Rugg, and wife of Rev. Rugg, formerly pastor of the Baptist church of this city. Mrs. Rugg, accompanied by her husband, left Westminister, B. C. last April, for a visit with their daughter, Mrs. Edna Hubbard, at Columbus, Ohio, and it was there that she was taken ill, and not able to return to her home in British Columbia. Paralysis was the immediate cause of Mrs. Rugg's death. The interment was at Hamilton, New York, former home of the deceased.

Mrs. Rugg was born in the state of New York, March 2, 1835, and was 54 years of age at the time of her death. She is survived by her husband and three children: Herbert, of New Westminister, B. C.; Mrs. Edna Hubbard, of Columbus, Ohio; Arthur E., of this city.

Ezra Henson, of Mount Hood.
Ezra Henson, residing near Mount Hood, died at his home on December 20, 1908, of heart failure. Deceased was born in Richmond, Ross County, Ohio, December 25, 1832. He was an Oregon pioneer, having come across the plains in 1852. He served in the Indian War of 1855-56, and was married in June 1856, to Miss Mary Orfield, who died in the year of 1889. Mr. Henson leaves three children, C. T. Henson and Mrs. Robert Treasure, of Mount Hood, and Mrs. M. E. Graves, of Oregon City.

Mrs. Fred Brown Dies at Sellwood.
Mrs. Fred W. Brown died in Sellwood, after an illness lasting five weeks. Mrs. Brown and family formerly lived in Oregon City, where she had a large circle of friends and acquaintances. She is survived by her husband and five children. The funeral was held in the Methodist Episcopal church in Sellwood at 2 P. M. Sunday.
