#### JUDGE IRA JONES DEAD.

Pioneer Attorney Passes in St. Vincent's Hospital, at Portland.

Ira Jones, one of the prominent pioneer attorneys of the state, died Wednesday night at 10:30 at St. Vincent's Hospital, after a few days' illness of heart disease, aged 75 years.

He married Matilda R. Lewis, of Victoria, New York, who, with one daughter, Mrs. H. Wickham Winthrop, of Denver, survive, and who were with him when the end came. He was well known in Portland, where he practiced law, after arriving in Oregon about 25 years ago. He resided in that city until several years ago, when he retired from active business and moved to Oregon City, residing on his farm on the West Side.

#### P. T. DAVIS, LUMBERMAN.

Grand Army Veteran Passes at Age of 66 Years.

While in conversation with a neighbor, near his sawmill, just east of Estacada, Philander T. Davis, aged 66 years, dropped dead at 4:30 P. M. Thursday from heart failure. Mr. Davis was born in Madison County, Indiana, in March, 1844. He came to Iowa with his parents in 1853. At the age of 21, he enlisted as a private with Company D, 28th Iowa Infantry, serving in the Civil War from September, 1865, until the Fall of 1868, when he was honorably discharged. While in Iowa, he married Miss Jennie Hayes, when they moved to Oregon and took up a homestead near Clackamas Station in the year 1869, since which time they resided in or near that place. He is a member of the G. A. R. Post of Oregon City, and a member of the I. O. O. F., of Clackamas Station. Mr. Davis was a pioneer sawmill man. His widow, two sons and a daughter survive him. The children are: Charles R. Davis, of Newport; Arthur C. Davis, of Milwaukie, and Mrs. Hattie E. Webster, of Estacada. Interment was at Sellwood.

#### JACKSON KNOTT'S DEAD.

Mulino Pioneer Passes At Age of 68 After Stroke of Paralysis.

Jackson Knotts, one of the prominent and highly respected Oregon pioneers, passed away at his home at Mulino Tuesday morning after a brief illness, having been stricken with paralysis on Sunday morning.

Jackson Knotts served his country three years during the Civil War, being a member of the Fortieth Iowa Infantry. After the close of the war he started for the West leaving Iowa in the year of 1867. He arrived in Umatilla county, having crossed the plains by ox team. He remained in that county for two years, after which he came to Clackamas county, and took up a claim at Mulino, where he has made his home ever since. He married Miss Martha Cassidy, in 1867, who was one of the party crossing the plains at the same time Mr.

Knott's train came. His parents preceded him here, and were among the old time settlers. Mr. Knotts was known throughout Clackamas county, and was of a jovial disposition, always looking on the bright side of life.

Deceased leaves a widow and the following children: Mrs. L. P. Burns, of Adkins Mill; Mrs. J. H. Coleman, of Oregit, California; Mrs. Charles Nash, of Oregon City; Clarence Nash, of Baker City.

George Schiewe, of Clarks. The funeral of the late George Schiewe, who died Wednesday at the home of his father, Peter Schiewe at Clarks, was held Friday afternoon at that place, the remains being interred in the Clarks cemetery. Deceased was 2 years of age and was a native of North Dakota. He resided in Clackamas county for several years.
